SUSTAINED BY THE SUPREME COURT.

It is understood that the Independents in Littleton township are concen trating their strength against Mr. J W. Northington, amember of the pres ent board of Halifax county com missioners and one of the nominees on the regular Democratic ticket for reelection. They hope to injure the regular Democratic ticket if possible by defeating Mr. Northing-

Their charge and grievance against Mr. Northington is that he acted contrary to law in casting his vote as member of the board of commissionerlast year against granting license to sell liquor within a mile of Littleton Female College.

An act was passed by the Legislature of 1897 making it unlawful to sell li quor within one mile of Littletion Fe male College.

Acting on this statute the county commissioners refused to grant license to seil liquor in the town of Littleton.

The liquor men took the matter to the Superior court and lest their case. They took an appeal to the Supremcourt and that court has sustained the action of the lower court.

The bill creating the law was intrecan, passed by a Republican Legislature and is now sustained by a Reputlican Supreme court; withal a good thing throughout, and about the bas law we have ever known Republicans

Added to the strength of the statute, the contention of Mess. W A. Dunn and Howard Alston, attorney against the license before the county commissioners, was that because a ma jority of the citizens of Littleton pet tioned against license it ought not to be granted.

But the fact that the Supreme cour has sustained the whole proceedings knocks to the winds the Independents charges against Mr. Northington.
