



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THE Virginia Legislature has made it possible for street car companies to require negroes to ride separate from the whites. Great pressure is brought by the white people for such regula-Streest Car Trouble in tions. The negroes have held public meetings Richmoud. and have discussed the matter calmly and as dispassionately as they could, and have agreed among themselves not to ride

on the street cars set aside for them, but to walk. The Richmond News-Leader concludes editorial discussion of the matter as follows :

"The antagonism and prejudice between the two races will continue. It will develop in our public couveyances and in all the walks and acts of life. The best thing and only thing for the negro to do is to submit and make the best of it with good nature and patience, for he is in the presence of a race which he cannot fight or overcome, at the mercy of a force so far superior to his own that he cannot deal with it by process of law, by the influence of moral or political force, by intellectual effort or by revolution. In this special case, no injustice is done him. The place assigned him in the cars is as good as that given the whites. All he is asked to do is to keep to himself and allow the white people to do the same, so that intimate contact between the races shall be avoided as far as possible. The wise course for the colored people is to accept developments as they come. but to keep in their minds that the only hope for the peace and comfort of both races is that they shall be separated finally, not by the distance between one seat in a street car and another, but by miles of territory or ocean, so that the negro may establish a civilization and government of his own and a country in which he shall stand on his merits and be equal with all the other people there."

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Some time ago when the press of the country was giving much broadcast advice to farmers about the cotton crop of this year, THE COMMON-WEALTH suggested that the wisest thing for the Two Bales Instead of One farmers to do would be to make the acreage of last year produce a million bales more this year. The Wilmington Messenger is even more intensive than that, as will be seen in the following paragraph :

"There is a good deal of talk at this time about the increase of acreage to be planted in cotton. Of course, it would be a great thing for the Southern planters if they could intensify their farming so as to produce two bolls where one was heretofore grown. There would be where the farmer would grow rich. We cannot look for any such thing as this, but we expect to see the production per acre increased in the crop of the coming year. The high price of cotton and the scarcity of labor will cause this. Excepting the cost of fertilizing, it costs no more to raise two bales of cotton to the acre than it does to produce half a bale per acre. The demand for cotton is increasing so rapidly that there need be no fear of a return to the low prices for the staple of a few years ago. The farmers of the South need not be afraid of over-production. If the reports show an increase in acreage, there will be made an effort by the bears in the speculative market to reduce the price, and they may be successful for a while. But all the farmer has to do to get a good price for his cotton is to hold on to it until the scare about increased acreage has blown over. The supply is so short now that it will take a large crop this year to come up to the demand of consumers. A twelve million bale crop will not be a bit more than the factories of the world will require to supply the demand. Twelve million bales of cotton put on the market in 1904-'05 should bring more per pound than did a nine million or ten million bale crop a few years ago. To make money-good money-on cotton this year all a farmer has to do is to select good seed, fertilize his land and make it produce two bolls where it produced only one last year."
