Death of Mrs. Albezette.

Mrs. Martha Albezette, wife of Mr. Louis Albezette, died suddenly at 9 o'clock Sunday morning, Sept. 17, 1905, aged 58 years.

The remains were interred in the Baptist cemetery Monday Sept. 18, at 11 o'clock, Rev. J. H. Jarvis conducting the burial services.

Mrs. Albezette had been unwell for some months, but on the morning of her death there was nothing to indicate that her condition had changed. She went to the dining room as usual, and ate a hearty breakfast.

While sitting in the hall after breakfast she suddenly fell from her chair and was dead in a few moments.

She left a husband, two sons and two daughters. Only her husband and one daughter, Mrs. Taylor, were with her at the time of her death. The other daughter lives in New Jersey, one son lives in Massachusetts and the other here, but was away from home on a trip and did not know of his mother's death until he arrived home from Norfolk Monday just after the funeral.

Mrs. Albezette was born and reared at Bradford, England. The family came to this country in 1879. For ten years they lived in Durham, and

for more than a year they have been living in Scotland Neck.

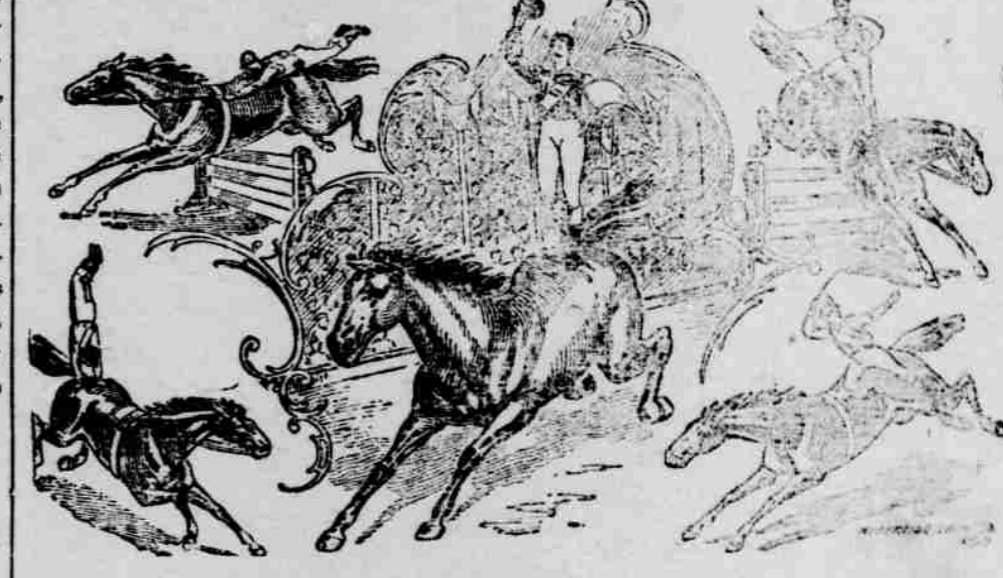

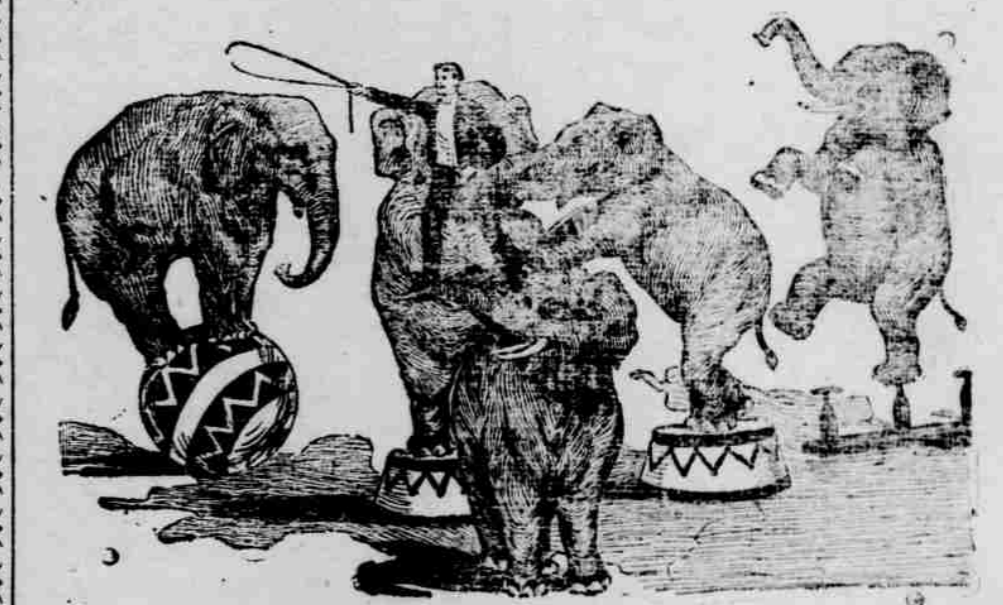

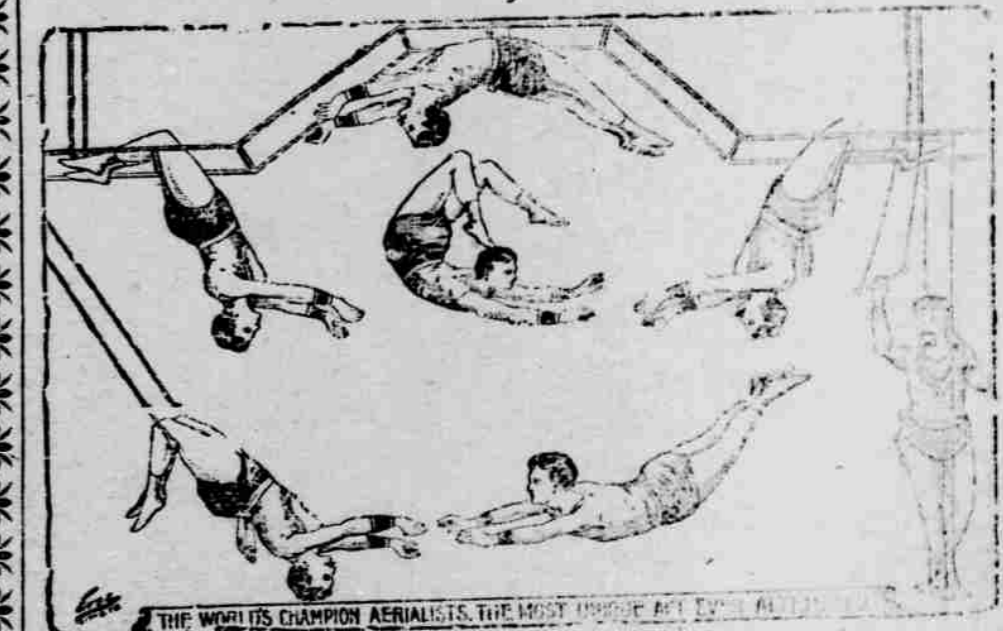
