The betting in New York on the success of Woodrow Wilson is still to be 11 to 9 in his favor.

And now we are told that our Vice-Presidential candidate comes from the famous Virginia Marshalls.

Mr. Eugene W. Chaffin, of Asheville, has been named for president on the prohibition ticket and Mr. Aaron S. Watkins, of Ohio, as the vice-president.

We are publishing this week the rules and regulations governing the Senatorial primary to be held on the day of the general election. Read them and then file them away for future reference.

The Senate of the United States by a vote of 55 to 25 created the junior Senator from Illinois, William Lorimer, Saturday afternoon. This is the second time he has been elected. The first time he retained his seat by a vote of 47 to 33. Senator Simmons changed his vote this time and voted against Lorimer.

The Democratic State Executive Committee made no mistake when they elected Hon. Chas. A. Webb, of Asheville, State chairman. Mr. Webb knows nothing but to fight and keep on fighting for the success of his party. He comes of the best Democratic blood there is in the State. We predict an increased majority for the State ticket under his leadership.

Mr. W. F. McCants, of New York, has been elected chairman of the Democratic national campaign and Mr. J. F. Davies, of Madison, Wis., was elected secretary. Madison is the choice of Woodrow Wilson for the position. He will open his headquarters in New York in the next few days and then the campaign for the election of the Democratic nominee will begin in real earnest.

The House of Representatives on Thursday of last week adopted impeachment articles against Judge Robert W. Archibald, of the United States Commerce Court. The impeachment grows out of charges that, while occupying a Federal court bench, Judge Archibald was connected with negotiations for a valuable coal bank in Pennsylvania and with other alleged questionable financial transactions and with using his official position to attempt to enrichment of himself and certain friends. It appears that they have a strong case against the Judge. The Senate will hear the case.

Wyoming's Woman Mayor.

Mrs. Susie Wiser, the first woman mayor in Wyoming—the first state to give women votes—was elected on an independent woman's ticket, against candidates of the Republicans and Democrats. The new mayor, a widow, has issued a declaration. She says:

"I am not going to let the women impose on the men. Now women are clamoring for immediate and drastic action against schoolteachers. The men have as many rights as women, and I am not going to permit the women to 'run over' them."

"But I am going to enforce the laws. The City Council composed of men alone, made the laws, and they will have to take their own medicine. I have appointed a marshal who believes as I do. Should he fail there are others who will not. If necessary, I will appoint as marshal the most rabid reformer in town."

The declaration of Widow Wiser has a wholesome sound. People of all opinions regarding suffrage will hope the new mayor means every word she says and has the courage of her convictions.

It still remains for Colonel Roosevelt to ratify the Wilson ticket.

GREAT ESTIMATE OF WILSON.

Strong Editorial from An Able New York Paper.

There could have been no better outcome of the long contest over the Democratic nomination for President at Baltimore than the candidacy of Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey. It might have come sooner but for the obstinate adherence of the supporters of Speaker Clark to their favorite, who took the lead on the first ballot, holding it until the 12th and at one time having over a majority of the delegates. We are not sure but that the efforts of Mr. Bryan to broadcast the New York delegation which supported Clark, to whose candidacy his own Nebraska delegation was pledged, helped toward the nomination of Wilson. At all events, after the Illinois delegation broke away and the name of Underwood was withdrawn, there was a rush for Wilson, which enabled the Clark vote to fall and gave the New Jersey Governor more than the necessary two-thirds without counting the "Murphy delegation" which carried the life of Bryan as the minion of the dragon of Wall Street.

There is no doubt of the progressiveness of Wilson. It is of the advanced but not the wildly radical order. He is a man of vigorous and able intellect, thorough training, wide study and scholarship, and talent for administration. He is an uncommonly persuasive speaker and writer, and comes so near being a practical statesman as almost any man who could be nominated now in public life. We have no reason to doubt the integrity of character and good-will he shows toward all who are engaged in the struggle for the nomination of a President of the United States. There is no reason to believe that, should he be elected, he will be less than the best of all possible Presidents. He is a man of the highest quality of his generation. Dr. Thomas Hume Dies at Chapel Hill.

Chapel Hill, July 10.—Dr. Thomas Hume, professor emeritus in the University of North Carolina, died here today. For many years he was professor of English in the university and was a notable linguist and scholar. Dr. Hume was 71 years old. His health had been bad for several years. The body will be taken to Washington, where the funeral will be held tomorrow. He is survived by his wife and two sons. He was one of the leading members of the Baptist church of North Carolina.
