**Forest Notes.**

Squirrels collect much of the seed used for planting by the forest service.

A growing scarcity of willow, generally used for wooden shoes in Europe, is leading to an adoption of poplar.

Torrey pine, a distinct California species, has been found in only two isolated localities in the southern part of the state.

One hundred acres on the Florida national forest will be sown to maritime pine seed this fall. Maritime pine is the source of the French turpentine industry.

San Francisco recently received its first cargo of lumber from the Tongass national forest, Alaska. The shipment consisted of 1,500,000 feet of Sitka spruce.

Three native species of larch furnish timber in the United States. One grows in New England and the lake states, another in the Pacific northwest, and the third in the high mountains of the northern Rockies. European larch has been planted extensively in the prairie states.

**THE ROANOKE ASSOCIATION**

**Annual Session Held With the Baptist Church Last Week—Goes to Rocky Mount Next Year.**

The sixth annual session of the Roanoke Association convened with the Baptist church here Tuesday night of last week and continued through Thursday afternoon. The annual sermon was preached by Rev. T. W. Chambliss, of Wilson, and it was a sermon of deep thought and power, and was very appropriate for the occasion. After the sermon Mr. T. M. Arrington called the Association to order and an organization was effected by the re-election of Mr. Arrington moderator and Rev. T. L. Vernon, of Hobgood, secretary and treasurer, and Dr. R. M. Johnson, of Scotland Neck, historian. The organization being perfected, by Rev. R. A. McFarland made a few timely remarks in welcoming the Association to his church and the town. The moderator responded to the address of welcome in a very happy style.

The Association convened promptly Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock. After devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. Sydney Cobb, the regular program was taken up as follows:

The object of the Association and State missions was discussed by Rev. G. J. Dowell, Dr. Livingston Johnson and Pastor McFarland, after which a collection was taken for Associational missions which amounted to \$3,300.

Strong addresses were made on Christian Education by President W. L. Potat of Wake Forest, and President R. T. Vann, of Meredith College. General Manager M. K. Kessler, of the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage, delivered a masterly address on orphanage work. There are now between four and five hundred children at the Thomasville Orphanage.

On Wednesday night a great mass meeting was held for the discussion of Home and Foreign missions, and addresses were made by Rev. W. B. Daughtry, Dr. I. M. Mercer, Rev. Mr. Spencer and Pastor R. A. McFarland. This was perhaps the most effective service of the association. Other addresses of power were delivered on the minor objects of the Baptist State Convention. Every speaker seemed to do his best.

**NOTES ON THE ASSOCIATION.**

The reports from the churches revealed splendid gains in membership and in collections, both for benevolences and for home purposes.

The Association is composed of sixty-two churches, situated in Martin, Beaufort, Wilson, Washington, Pitt, Edgewcombe and Halifax counties and is the youngest in the State, having been formed out of the Tar River Association six years ago.

There were more than two hundred in attendance as representatives of the various churches. The attendance of our town people at all the sessions of the Association was exceptionally large.

The committee on hospitality, of which Mr. C. F. Burroughs was chairman, did their work with such facility, ease and efficiency as to give satisfaction and delight.

The older members of the Association and the moderator declared this to be the most successful session in the history of the body, and the various delegates declared Scotland Neck to be one of the most delightful communities they ever visited.

The next session of the Association will be held with the Arlington Street church, Rocky Mount.
