

THE NEW POSTOFFICE

Some Business Dane and Facts Relat ing to Old Office.

The postoffice was removed to its new quarters Friday evening, and the change calls to mind a bit of history that may be of interest just well! cated on Main street next to the Planters & Commercial Bank, in a new building erected by A. Paul Kitchin for the purpose. The furnishings are all of the very latest design and is as complete as any postoffice in the State regardless of the size of the town. The building is a two story one with a store room ad-

For more than a quarter of a century the postoffice had been located in its building just vacated. When the office was first placed in this aged citizen of this place, was the postmaster. The receipts of the office were not much more than a trifle, as the town was nothing more than a country village with only two or three hundred citizens. Sometime in the 90's the late R. H. Smith, Shields, colored, was appointed by President McKinley. In 1902 the late Captain A. B. Hill was appointed postmaster, who died in February, 1906, and his daughter, Miss Elizabeth Hill, the present postmistress,

During the first year of Captain Hill's administration the receipts of the office were \$3,045.09 and for the year closing July 1, 1913, the re-Miss Selma Twisdale 42,750 ceipts amounted to \$5,757.13, a gain of \$3,712.04, in a little more than a decade.

During Miss Hill's incumbency in office she has given universal satisfaction, and every patron of the office has been accorded the same prompt and courteous attention.
