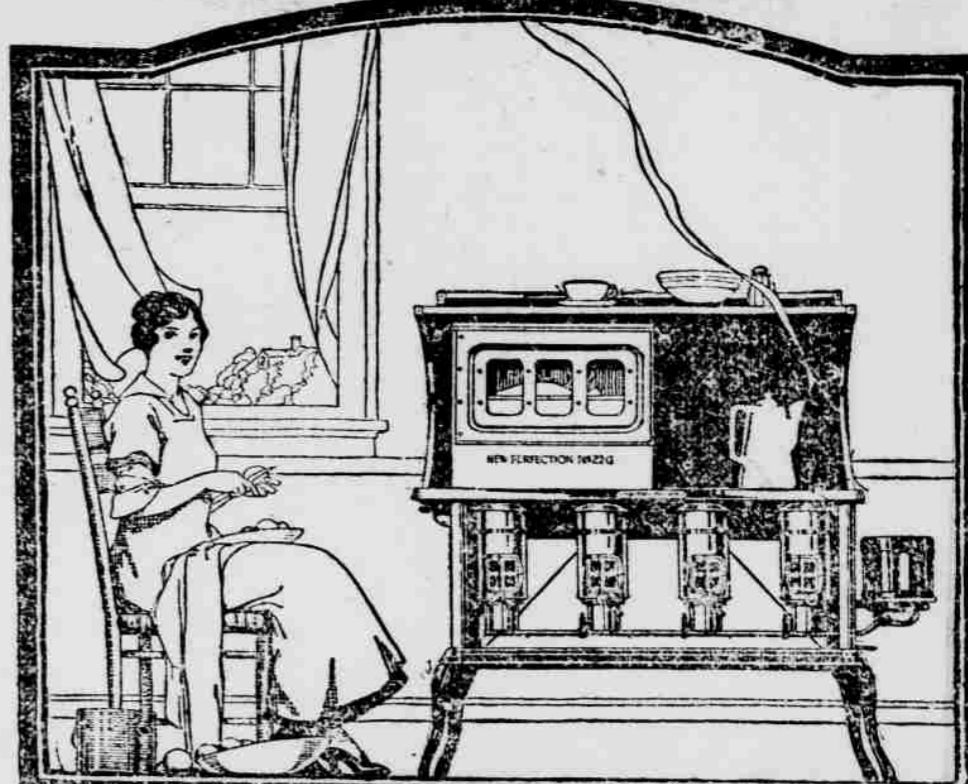
## Have to Say About Him

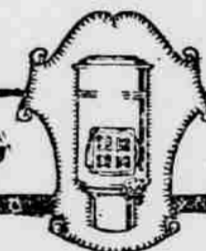

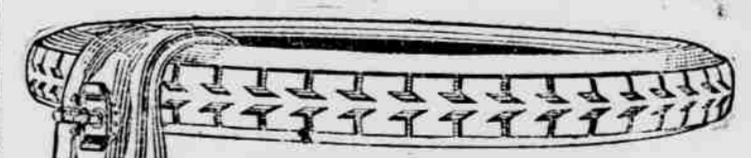
