NORTH CAROLINA LOSS IN FOOD WASTE

Raleigh, May 18.—Experts of the Department of Agriculture at Washington have estimated that if just one ounce of edible meat or fat is wasted by each of the 20,000,000 families in the United States each day it means a total waste of 1,250,000 pounds per day or the staggering total of 465,000, 600 pounds in a year, the equal of 875,000 steers or 3,000,000 hogs. If one ounce of bread is wasted by each family each day it reams the throwing away of \$75,000 lbs. of flour each day, or 1,500,000 barrels each year-sufficient tiour with which to make 365,000,000 loaves of bread. Stated in terms of wheat it is 7,000,000 bushels.

Secretary Lucas of the North Carolina Food Conservation Commission has figured out North Carolina's part of such a waste. There are approximately 600,000 families in the State. An ounce of meat or fat and an ounce of bread wasted each day menas in a year's time in this State a loss of 13,680,000 pounds of meat, the equivalent of 90,000 hogs, and 10, 950,000 loaves of bread, or 210, bushels of wheat.

"These figures simply show," stated Mr. Lucas, "what a very small waste amounts to in the aggregate. 
