NO DIRECT REQUESTS WILL BE ANSWERED

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) Washington, July 27-Smothered with questions about every conceivable angle of the draft the provost marshal general's office has announced that those in doubt must ask their local exemption board and not write to the Washington headquarters.

The local exemption boards will refer to the governor of the state all those question they cannot themselves answer, and fithe governor is unable to give the answer he will ask the provost marshal general for a ruling on the special question.

No requests from individuals, or local boards, will be considered unless sent through the governor.
