Further announcement is made ENEMY U-BOAT of the British attacking against Gouzeaucourt and Epehy, which attacks were repulsed, according to the German official statement.

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
Paris Sept 10-The British to day hold their old trenches facing the Hindenburg line at Gouzeau court as the result of a brief and brisk engagement.
