WASHINGTON, OCT. 15.—AUTOCRACY MUST GO BEFORE PEACE CAN BE ARRANGED WITH GERMANY, ARE IN THE CONDITIONS LAID DOWN BY PRESIDENT WILSON IN A NOTE TO GERMANY, WHICH ALSO BORE NOTICE THAT NO ARMISTACE IS POSSIBLE WHILE GERMANY CONTINUES TO BE INHUMAN, ILLEGAL PRACTICES ON LAND AND SEA. SATISFACTORY SAFE GUARDS AND GUARANTEES OF MAINTENANCE OF PRESENT ALLLIED SUPREMACY MUST BE GIVEN AS A PRELIMINARY TO ANY ARMISTACE ARRAN GEMENTS, AND MILITARY ADVISERS WILL BE RESPONSI- BLE FOR ITS ARRANGEMENT.
