

PROPOSED CANADIAN LABOR LEGISLATION

A report from Ottawa, Canada, states that unqualified approval of the principle of collective bargaining and an eight hour day, dy cured me. I have recommended together with other far-reaching recommendations as to changes in Canada's industrial system, are included in a majority report of the Commission on Industrial Relations which was presented to the House of Commons yesterday. It appears that the commission was appointed for the purpose of investigating the causes of the industrial unrest which has recent ly manifested itself throughout Canada. Following are the princi pal recommendations made by the report: An eight hour day; a weekly rest of at least twentyfour hours; a minimum wageespecially for women, girls, and unskilled labor; government action to relieve unemployment thru the erection of public works; government aid in the building of workers' homes; restoration of full liberty of speech and press; and the establishment of a bureau for the promotion of industrial councils to bring employers and workers together. Recommendation was also made in the report for an inquiry by experts as to the practicability of establishing a system of State insuranie against sickness, unemployment, and old age. The report states that many employers agree with the workers as to the need of changes in the basis of industry, but that there is a difference of opinion as to the best methods for accomplishing the desired end.

GERMANY AND THE FORMER KAISER

There is a movement on foot in Germany to get the Kaiser back from Holland. Various newspapers in unoccupied Germany are carrying the following advertisement, inserted under the auspices of the Officer's Alliance:

"We have telegraphed the Holland Government as follows:

"The German Officers' Alliance filled with gratitude for the hospitality afforded the German Kai ser by Helland, in the name of millions of Germans, requests the Government of the Netherlands to refuse to deliver the Kaiser to the Entente. We cannot now

defend our former War Lord with our bodies, but we expect the magnanimity of the Dutch to spare us this final and most humiliating disgrace."

It is to be observed that this

advertisements were inserted by

"Officers' Alliance," presumably a clique of militarists and junkers who, naturally enough, would want their idol back. These are the very men upon whom the Kai ser lavished his favors, the 'vons' and petty titles so dear to the heart of the German climber. Why shouldn't they want him back? It is not to be taken for granted, however, that this desire is widespread throughout Germany. We may be over optimistic, but it is our opinion that the German people, the rank and file who have fought the war and endured terrible loss of life and limb have but little if any love for their defeated and discredit-Ited tyrant. The danger it seems to us, lies the other way. For years the Kaiser, and before him cialist revolutionaries. Now, with Roads. all barriers swept away, the German people may fall prey to the new doctrine to which Russia and Hungary have already succumbed—Bolshevism and not Kai serism, seems to us the present great German danger.


