## WANT JAPANESE TO BECOME CITIZENS

Honolulu, T. H., Nov. 14.—A movement looking to the abolition of the dual citizenship of Hawaiian born Japanese has been launched at an Hawaii Civic Convention, on the Island of Maui. Resolutions were adopted asserting that there are in Hawaii, a large number of children who, under the laws of the United States are American citizens and, under the laws of the empire of Japan, are potentially citizens of Japan. The convention declared "there is room in this territory for men and women who are either citizens of Japan or of the United States; but no place for those who are citizens of both countries."

## COAST CITIES JAIL 200 I. W. W. SUSPECTS

Raids In Towns And Cities Net Many Offenders

## HUNT STILL GOES ON

Seattle, Nov. 14.—Nearly two hundred men, suspected of being members of the Industrial Workers of the World, are in jails in various cities and towns of the Pacific northwest today as the result of raids growing out of the "Armistice Day" shooting at Centralia, Wash.

In addition twenty-six alleged members of the I. W. W. are in jail at Centralia and Chehalis in connection with the shooting.

## SOUTH GERMANY GETS SEA OUTLET

Berlin, Oct. 14.—South Germany will have direct communication with the sea when plans for extending the navigability of the Main, already in process of execution, have materialized. In Schaffenburg a large harbor is to be created. This will consequently become the main terminus for the shipping route to Rotterdam. The construction of a Danube-Main canal is also contemplated.

## FIUME BLOCKADE NOW RAISED BY ITALIANS

Copenhagen, Nov. 14.—Italy has officially raised the blockade of Fiume, according to advices from that city received through Austria.

## RUMANIA DOMINATES CITY OF BUDAPESTH

Berlin, Nov. 14.—"Hardly has the train reached the East Station than one notices that Budapest is an occupied city," according to the Tagblatt's special Budapest correspondent. "The chief of station is a Rumanian officer, the station guard is composed of Rumanian soldiers, the arriving passengers are requested with friendly blows from clubs to stand in a long line and give the commanding Rumanian officer the travel pass.

"The baggage is minutely searched and it is more than an hour before it is possible to leave the station. It is almost impossible to get a cab, and if one does find one, the coachman immediately asks if one has "blue money," the old old Austro-Hungarian bills in contradiction to the "white" money of the soviet regime.

"If one has the blue money the ride throughout the entire city begins, for lodging in a hotel is almost impossible to find, since nearly all are taken over by the Entente missions and the Rumanian officers. It frequently happens that strangers spend days without a place to sleep in Budapest.

## FINLAND WILL FIGHT WITH GEN. YUDENITCH

Furnish Thirty Thousand Men To Take Petrograd

## ADVICE TO DORPAT

Helsingfors, Nov. 14.—The Baltic States conference at Dorpat has been advised that Finland has decided to assist General Yudenitch with 30,000 volunteers in a new attempt to take Petrograd within the next few weeks.

## BOLL WEEVIL IN NORTH CAROLINA

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 14.—At present the bollweevil infestation of North Carolina is confined to Columbus, Brunswick and New Hanover counties, states Mr. R. W. Leiby, Assistant Entomologist of the State Department of Agriculture, following the completion of the survey of counties north of these three made during the past week. The counties of Pender, Bladen, Robeson, Scotland and Richmond were scouted at numerous places, the weevil not being found in any of these. The boll weevil line extends slightly north of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad running from Chadbourn east to Wilmington.

Officials of the Division of Entomology of the Agricultural Department are not taking any chances, however, and have declared a safety zone approximately thirty miles wide north of this boll weevil line. The northern boundary of the safety zone extends from South Carolina at a point west of Lumberton in Robeson County; through the middle of Bladen County (about five miles north of Elizabethtown) across the southern end of Sampson County; crosses Pender County at Watha, and strikes the coast at the junction of Pender and Onslow counties.

The creation of this safety zone is in line with the procedure of entomologists of states to the south which the weevil has already traversed. It is designed to hinder the artificial advance of the weevil northward by prohibiting the shipment of cottonseed, seed cotton, cottonseed hulls, used cotton bagging, or cotton in any part of the State, and from the safety zone to any part of the State, except the weevil zone.

The quarantine will be strictly enforced by inspectors of the Division of Entomology, and violators of this law will be punished and their shipments confiscated by the Department of Agriculture.

It is probable, thinks Mr. Leiby, that in the near future another thirty mile wide zone will be created north of the safety zone. Shipments of the above named products from this third zone would be allowed upon receipt of a permit from the State Entomologist, which would be issued if the authorities had evidence that it was absolutely safe to do so.

The importance of such stringent regulations and the erection of safety zones is readily conceded in view of a known biological factor of the weevil, namely, that it may advance from twenty to thirty miles in one flight, and

## LETTER FROM RUSSIA

London, Nov. 14.—The speedy and peaceful settlement of the British railway strike was a sore disappointment to Russian Bolsheviks. They hoped that it would develop into open revolution. That was shown by a wireless message that was transmitted from Petrograd with compliments to the British railwaymen." It stated:

"We, the railwaymen of Red Petrograd, have heard the news of your general strike with joy and enthusiasm. You have broken the chains of civil peace. You have declared war on your government. You must pass from a general strike to an armed rising. In order to improve your economic position you must first destroy the present imperialist order of things and substituted for it a government of workers and peasants. Do not allow the leaders of the old trade union school to get at the head of the movement as they will betray you at the last decisive moment. Victory is yours if you fight to the end.

"As to ourselves we will fight until the whole world is covered with red flags. Down with the League of Nations. Long live British soviet power."

## EAST CAROLINA R. R. IS INCORPORATED

Raleigh, Nov. 14.—The East Carolina Terminal Railroad Company, with its principal office at Tarboro, received incorporation papers from the Secretary of State yesterday.

The concern contemplates the operation of a twenty-mile railroad from near Tarboro to some point in Halifax or Edgecombe counties toward Enfield.

The authorized capital is \$100,000 and the subscribed capital \$20,000. The incorporators are: Theo Fountain, C. L. Fountain and L. B. Pennington, all of Tarboro, N. C.

## GERMAN OFFICERS TRAIN CHILDREN

Berlin, Nov. 14.—Charlottenburg scholars in the higher schools are being trained for two hours in the afternoon in the art of using machine guns, hand grenades and rifles, according to a Charlottenburg citizen who writes to the People's Gazette, the popular edition of the Tagblatt.

The writer declares that during the past few weeks he has had repeated opportunity to witness the training in a military sense of children between 12 and 16 years of age, on a big field in Charlottenburg.

The training was carried out in the same way as during the best days of the imperial regime. The man in charge was a lieutenant, and non-commissioned officers conducted the training, with the use of all the military curse and command terms used in the old army.

The People's Gazette appeals to Minister of Education Haenisch, "who is responsible for the upbringing of youth," to investigate and eliminate what it calls a "scandalous situation."

The Independent Socialist newspaper Freiheit had a similar story of hand grenade and machine gun instruction recently. Although it was printed conspicuously, no attention was paid to it by either the police or the Ministry of Education. The People's Gazette asks whether the authorities cannot, or will not, answer.
