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GERMANY MUST MAKE DEPOSIT OF 20 MILLION MARKS IN GOLD

Reparation Amount Is Fixed Germans Must Deliver Securities Or Other Valuables To Cover

AMBASSADORS FINISH DETAILS

Paris, Jan. 13.—With the opening Saturday of the period during which Germany must pay reparations to the allies it is announced the commission on reparations must fix the amount due by Germany before May 1st, 1921. Until the amount is fixed Germany must deposit 20,000,000 marks in gold, or its equivalent in securities, ships, securities or coal.

STRUGGLE FOR LIFE

Berlin, Jan. 13.—"If a general railway strike breaks out we face a struggle for naked life," says the Catholic organ, Germania, commenting on the imminent danger of a general walkout of the rail men. "The difficult situation of the railway employees is obvious, and their demands, as far as they are justified, and grantable, must be complied with."

"The railway administration, under all circumstances wishing to avoid a conflict, is ready to make the utmost concessions, but, as the administrator of public property, is bound to examine demands conscientiously."

"If portions of the people become nervous, the responsible authorities must remain the more clear-headed, and should not try to appease the hunger of others with machine guns, but if stubbornness, or even criminality, try to draw profit from common distress for political or personal purposes, the government must not shrink from drastic remedies."

Paris, Jan. 13.—Japan has decided to withdraw her warships from Fuchow, China, where they were sent some weeks ago owing to the maltreatment of Japanese subjects, according to information received by the Japanese delegation to the Peace Conference.

BRITISH ARE RIGHTING HER TRADE BALANCES

London, Jan. 12.—The adverse balance of trade against Great Britain as shown by comparison of her exports and imports during the month of November was the lowest attained since the armistice. Its total was £36,200,000.

Britain's exports, measured about £9,000,000 in November while in the same period her imports decreased about 20,000,000. The decline in imports is attributed by the American Chamber of Commerce in London to the decline in imports in the United States. It is stated that shipping troubles in America probably reduced British imports but at the same time improved her own

STOCK PROMOTERS FLOURISH IN NEW YORK

New York, Jan. 13.—Stock promoters and swindlers who have been driven from 38 states where "blue sky" laws exist, are flourishing in New York as never before according to Edwin J. P. Kilroe, Assistant District Attorney, in charge of the investigation of commercial frauds.

Mr. Kilroe charges that most of the operators are composed of "confidence men, ex-convicts, racketeers, touts, gamblers and men of the baser sort" who, as soon as their crooked work is made public, move to another part of the metropolis and resume business under another name.
