TWO BROTHERS ELECTROCUTED IN RALEIGH THIS MORNING

Joe And Gardner Cain Moonshiners, Both Declared They Were Ready To Die

FOR MURDERING RILEY EASTER

Raleigh, March 5.—Filed twelve days ago and Gardner Cain and Sorely County moonshiners were electrocuted at the state prison here this morning for the murder of Riley Easter. This was the first double execution of two men to take place in this state. The brothers were baptised yesterday by a Methodist minister and both went their way declaring they were ready to die, Joe being executed first. The man displayed the slightest emotion as he was led from the cell to the death house. Both were saying "I am ready to go to God." Easter was killed by the Cains and Joe Bowles when they returned home because Jim Bowles son they claimed had refused a whiskey still belonging to them and reported them to the authorities. The Cains and Bowles were considered of a degree murder and the three were sentenced to die in the electric chair. The governor recently pardoned Bowles, sentence of five years imprisonment, but he is to cooperate with the state police in the Cains.

LOADS OF WOMEN LEAVE BRITON FOR CANADA ALREADY

Excess of Women a Million And a Quarter

SPINSTERS THERE

New York, March 4.—The Salvation Army in the British Isles, working in cooperation with the government is promoting emigration of the approximately 1,200,000 women in excess of the male population there. Commissioner David C. Lamb, London foreign secretary of the Army on a mission to the United States has announced here.

Spinsters or emigration is the fate of these women, the commissioner asserted, adding:

"We offer no apology for active propaganda designed to procure a better distribution of the sexes. There are a million and a quarter more women than men in the British Isles today, and one of the biggest after the war has been assigned the Salvation Army in Britain is to stimulate female emigration and direct it to those colonies in the British Empire such as western Canada and portions of Africa and Australia where there are more male than female inhabitants. The prospect of placing female domestics in the United States has not been overlooked.

"The Salvation Army has dispatched several shiploads of emigrants to Canada already. We help them make arrangements to leave the old country, provide transportation when necessary and through our world-wide organization see to it that the emigrants are safely settled in the new land.

"Our records show that of the girls who emigrated some years ago to certain sections where women were in the minority 60 per cent were married within three years of their arrival. This fact and the opportunities for work at good wages in other lands are of great significance to the tens of thousands of thoughtful and enterprising women in the British Isles."

TURKS LAUGH AT ALLIED THREATS

The Nationalists supporters predict a war in the Spring if the Greek are left Smyrna and the French Cilicia. They laugh at the Allied threats and the naval displays and say the Allies cannot wage a successful war in the interior of Asia Minor.

Reno, Nev., March 5.—Mary Pickford motion picture star, was granted a divorce from Owen Moore on Monday evening at Minden, a small town near Carson City, on grounds of desertion. She has been at the Campbell ranch at Genoa, nearby, since February 15. She was accompanied to the court room by her mother, Mrs. Smith, and she wept freely while testifying.

Moore was not in court, though he was at Minden at lunch on Monday. He was represented by an attorney in the proceedings. Mrs. Pickford is still at Genoa.

Mrs. Pickford told the court that Moore had deserted her on several occasions and had only returned in response to her pleas, but that a year ago he left her and has ever since refused to return.

Immediately after obtaining the divorce she went back to the ranch where she has been for several weeks. She said she was looking for a quiet place to live and intended to stay near Minden for a long time and to make the state her permanent home.

Moore arrived at Virginia City on Sunday night with a party of four, saying he intended to take some pictures for a coming picture, but he could find no suitable accommodations so stayed at a hotel in a nearby town.
