Empowered by an act of Congress, the Director of the Census, Sam L. Rogers, has divided North Carolina into ten districts for the census of manufacturers, mines, quarries, etc.

A chief special agent is placed in charge of each district and is directly responsible to the director.

To secure such an appointment is no little honor and a very great responsibility.

However great may be the influences politically, yet the essential qualities are the man himself experience proven, and capacity for the big job.

Our friend and townsman, Mr. David M. Prince, has just received the appointment for Chief Special Agent of the Second District of North Carolina, comprising the counties of Johnston, Wayne, Lenoir, Craven, Carteret, Jones, Onslow, Pamlico, Pitt and Beaufort.

Given the authority of selecting his headquarters, Mr. Prince has selected Goldsboro.

Mr. Prince, who is now Assistant Supervisor of Census for the Third District of North Carolina will enter upon his new duties about the first of May.

We are in a position to know that this appointment came as a surprise to Mr. Prince.

This is a distinctive promotion for Mr. Prince, and coming as it does in the face of the fact that several of his political enemies only a few weeks ago tried hard to oust him as Census Supervisor on the grounds of undue political activity while holding a government appointive office, is cause for deep gratification on the part of himself and friends.

Director of the Census, Sam L. Roberts, is a close observer of men and their fitness for the position he has to give. He is a North Carolinian and a warm personal friend of Mr. Prince. To him and to our most excellent Congressman, Sam M. Brinson, and Senator F. M. Simmons, who are staunch friends of Mr. Prince, we tender our thanks for thus honoring our town and county.

"Six Days Shalt Thou Labor And Do All Thy Work"

The same God who laid upon the children of Israel the injunction to observe the sanctity of the Sabbath proclaimed also the holiness of toil and declared that labor is the law of salvation. In this crucial period of human history it behooves us all to give heed not to one-seventh of this commandment only, but to the six-sevenths with which the Almighty glorified toil and translated work into a form of worship.

There is nothing in this commandment that we of the present day are warranted in interpreting as Divine Sanction for shorter hours or artificial restriction of production. "Six days shalt thou labor"—not six hours a day, not even eight hours a day, but so many hours as may be required to do all thy work. So long as production lags behind the needs of a hungry world, all our work is not done, and every hour wrested from the working schedule of the week is an hour of violence to humanity and of blasphemy to God.

If the executives, the sales managers, the bookkeepers, the stenographers and the clerks, the advertising men and those of the sales force do not work with a keener sense of the obligations that rest upon them—if those in the high places do not make their brains more productive, small license shall they have for casting the stone of opprobrium at the ignorant, the brutal and the reactionary in the ranks of organized or unorganized physical labor.—From "Paragrafs", issued by the Whitaker Paper Co., Cincinnati.
