calls upon the Germans to abrogate the treaty with Russia or be debarred from the Genoa conference in discussing Russian affairs.

It is too late now to try to . hold the whip over Germany and Russia and to tell them what they may or may not do. The treaty between them is signed and we do not believe that either party to the trade will be induced to withdraw, for it means a great strengthening of both and the Germans realize that it puts them in a much stronger position in dealing with the Allies, and no doubt Russia feels that it will mean the speedy rehabilitation of that country. Sooner or later it will be found that Japan will be drawn into an understanding between the three and then the balance of the world may look to its own interests, for that would be ofrmidable alliance and one which would threaten the peace and safety of the world. The allies have been hoodwinked by Germany and Russia and the sooner they realize it and make preparations to meet the menace of this union the stronger their position will be to combat that influence.
