## EXACT THE FULL PENALTY

An automobile driven in life under any circumstances, Published. but a car driven by a drunken, irresponsible person becomes a death dealing instrument and is a menace to any one traveling the highways. There is a State law providing the penalty for driving a car while in an intoxicated condition and this law should be enforced to the letter in every instance of violation.

If reports are true that the negro who smashed the buggy on the Hobgood road opposite the Ferrell Farm Sunday was in an intoxicated condition, or even had been drinking, and was not showing proper regard for the rules of the road and did not give the driver of the buggy sufficient passing room, he should be prosecuted to the full extent of any existing laws regardless of what influence may be brought to bear, and the law abid ing citizens of this town and community should make it their business to see that it is done even to the extent of employing a prosecutor, if necessary.

Any man, rich or poor, white or colored, who drives a car up on the highways in an intoxicated condition is not only endangering 'iis own life, but is a menace to the public, and regardless of pairs will be locked up in the whom he may be he should be safe until my return, so as to severely dealt with. 


