### DR. HUNT WILL RETURN NEXT WEEK

In all probability Dr. C. C. Hunt, Federal Veterinarian, will return to Scotland Neck about Wednesday, Aug. 30th. The agricultural agent is making a special effort to get him back to serve some of the farmers who are slow in having this work done. A good many of the farmers wait until cholera is next door to them or in their herds and then they call for a veterinarian. We have had a persistent case of cholera in the lower end of the county and if all the farmers would inoculate their hogs, we could get rid of it.

Dr. Hunt has about twelve counties to serve and it is only on the good will of Dr. Hunt that the agricultural agent has been able to get him back here as often as he has. When the agricultural agent gets the services of these specialists, it is up to the farmers to use them at the time they come to this county, and when you do not take advantage of this work, you are only delaying the program that the agricultural agent has mapped out.

When Dr. Hunt comes this time, it will be to the advantage of the farmers to use him for he will not return for about two months.

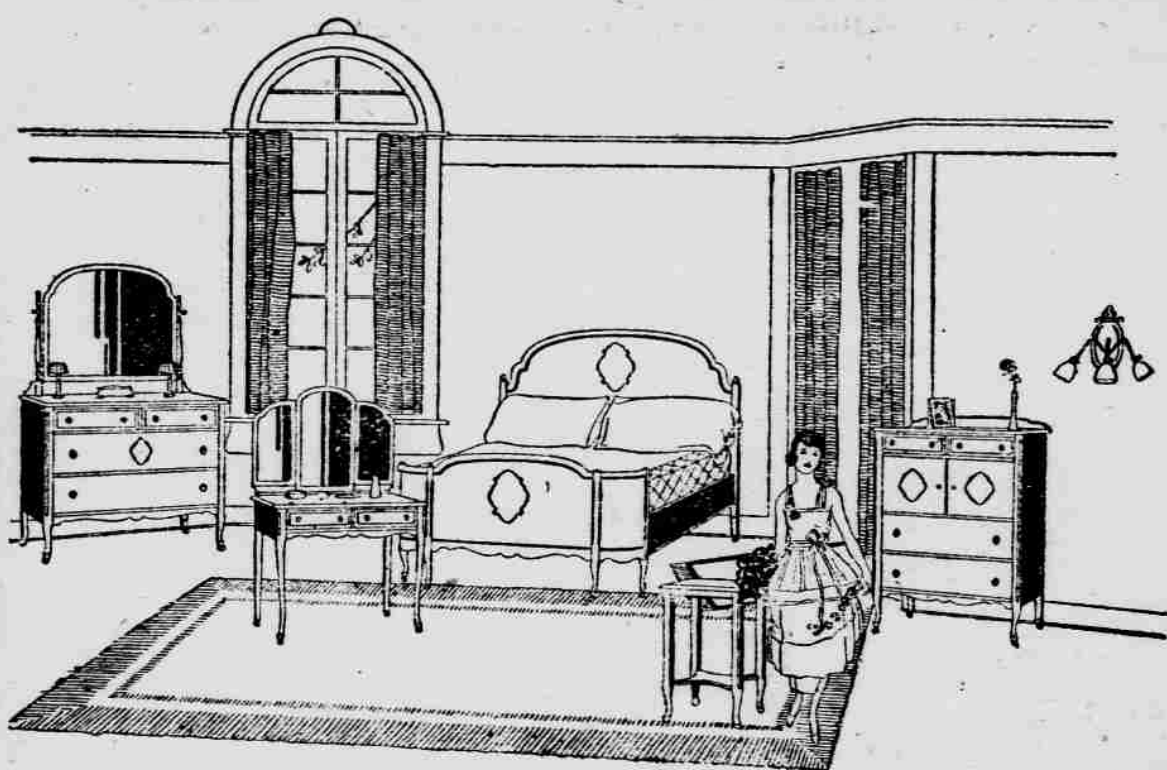
