Vienna, Oct. 25 .- The liquida tion of the vast Hapsburg holdings in Austria, with the exception of the possessions considered private, will be completed shortly, and the final report is expected to show the disposal of properties valued at many milliards of crowns. Most of the funds realized through the sale and the leasing of former court buildings will be used for the benefit of war invalids.

The large reduction in territory now under the government of Austria has greatly diminishedthe amount of space required for administration purposes, and many blocks of offire buildings have been rented to private indi-

The possessions considered as private have been reduced to the minimum.
