Had his motor failed him, no trace of aviator or plane would probably ever have been discovered. As it was, he was forced to land night. when only forty minutes of flying separated him from his goal. A driving rain and thunderstorm forced him down on an islet in the Tigre River, where his plane became mired in the soft sand, causing him to break a propeller. A passing launch from Iquitos picked him up and carried the stranded aviator to the isolated Amazon port, where he was given a tremendous ovation. His flying time from Chiclayo up to the moment of the accident was elso six hours, or a total of 12 hours from Lima.
