The tables of immigration, which we publish in another column, convey interesting information. It ppears that nearly one-half-ninetwentieths of our immigrants are from Ireland and a litte more than seven-twentieths from Germany, England furnishes, one-tenth, while Scotland, France, and Switzerland afford altogether, nearly one-twentieth. The remaining twentieth is divided among twenty-one different nations. The amount of specie brought by these immerants we are surprised to find nearly \$8,000,000; an average of about \$76 per man. We perceive, however, that the table, in this respect, is antrustworthy, because the same avcrage sum redited to the emigrants of every nation. Such a coincidence is extremely improbable. The improvident Irish certainly do not bring as much money as the prudent, forehanded Swedes, Swiss, Germans and Scotch. With the single exception of last year, the present ha) brought less foreigners to our shores than any for the past ten. In 1854, 319,223 were received-more than three times as many as in 1867 The State of New York, because of country, the fondings of the Irish for the city, takes more Virtue. than four-tenths of the whole, Pennsylvania and New Jersey take 14,000, or nearly threetwentieths, probably mostly Germans and Welsh. We regret to see that all the western agricultural States, including California, Kansus, Nebriska and New Mexico, take only threetenths. Every industrious emigrant who goes to the agricultural districts, whether he has money or no, may become an acquisition to the country. But the greater number of those who tarry in the city become, directly or indirectly, a burden. They swell the ranks of mendicancy and vastly increase the expense of our municipal government. Even the most industrious often need charity, and it is well known that more than half the cost of our police department is caused by foreigners. The necessary demor-alization of the community is very great, but not so easily calculated. But while permanent immigrants have thus

given us themselves and their small medium of cash, we ee that at least 49,000 American citizens have returned during the year, to this port alone, from traveling in Europe, where they could not have expended less than \$16,000,000, and probably much more. This money-at least \$8,000,000 in excess of the receipts from immigrants-has been expended without material quid pro quo, and is a significant indication of American prosperity.—N. Y. World.
