REMARKABLE AFFECTION.—In one compartment of the cage in which the animals perform, at Van Amburgh's (lawful manager) in Chesnut street, is a large lawful Asiatic lion. His room mate is a black female tiger. The tiger is small compared with the royal lion, but is highly valued as a zoological curiosity, and the only specimen of the black tiger in this country. She was purchased by Mr. Van Amburgh several years ago, and has lived with the lion ever since. The attachment between the two is something remarkable. When other animals is in the same cage, and any affront is offered to the little tiger, she runs under the belly of the lion, and he will protect her with his paw. No matter how hungry he may be, the lion never touches his share of the daily meal until his life-cum has selected her share, and even this he eats entirely contented. It is certain that she has enough, as the animals are not fed separately, but this black tiger is a milder in her propensities, and not merely exists for the matter. She has been twice removed from the lion, but until she was returned, she was not fed again. She neither food nor rest, while the frantic manner in which he flashed at the bars was sufficient warning that the further detention of the tiger would be a dangerous matter. It should his mate, the lion would probably pine away, and die. Once when she was taken away, a lioness was substituted. The lion instantly fell upon her, and at single bite broke her spine, and crushed some of her ribs. Careful nursing saved her life, and she is still living, but with her hinder parts immovably paralyzed.—Philadelphia North American.

THE POWDER STORY.—The Portsmouth Transcript has it from an authentic source, that the rumored mysterious substance of powder from the naval magazine at Fort Norfolk, is all beach. The only real transfer of ammunition recently made from the magazine, was upon request of the Washington Navy Yard, for experimental purposes. No powder has been removed to Old Point, of any other kind, secretly or otherwise, except the case mentioned above. The powder, a thousand kg of a hundred pounds each, have recently been added to the supply there.

A QUESTION FOR MATHEMATICIANS AND ECONOMISTS.
17 1/2 lbs of gas is consumed through eight burners, in 9 nights, at a cost of \$5 per ton, and fuel, how much is consumed by each burner per hour? at what cost, and what would be the cost of an equal amount of light, obtained from Kerosene Oil? Answer: There is consumed by each burner, 25 feet per night, or 6 feet per hour, at a cost of 6 cents per hour per burner.
