Poisonous ANTIDOTE.—Farm stock raising and classy breeding have been my employment. I now tell our readers something which I think will be useful for them to know. The subject that I will introduce is poison and its sovereign remedy.

Twenty years since I learned that sweet oil could cure the bite of a rattlesnake, I reckoned that it would cure other poison snakes. Observation and experience have taught me that it will cure poison of any kind both in man and beast. I think no farmer should be without a bottle of it in his house. The patient must take a spoonful internally and bathe the wound externally. To cure a horse it requires eight days. It is a sovereign remedy for the most venomous snakes in the neighborhood, eleven years ago this summer, where the case had been over thirty hours standing, and the patient given up to die by the doctors. I heard of it, carried the oil and gave him one spoonful which created a cure. It can also be used for arsenic and strichnine. It will cure cattle, caused by eating too freely of fresh carrots with corn stalks, beans, spiders, ants, insects, and it will also cure persons who have been poisoned by a low running stream in meadows, called ivy.
