Public Acts OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES,

[PUBLISHED IN THE WILMINGTON HERALD BY AUTHORITY.]

Passed at the first session* which was begun and held at the City of Washington, in the District of Columbia, on Thursday, the fourth day of Ju-ly, A. D. 1861, and ended on Tuesday, the sixth day of August, A. D. 1861. ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President. HANNIBAL HAM LIN, Vice-President, and President of the Senate SOLOMON FOOTE was elected President of the Senate, pro tempore, on the eighteenth day of Ju ly, and continued so to act until the close of the session. GALUSHA A. GROW, Speaker of the Whittemore :--House of Representatives.

CHAP. XXXVIII.—An Act to provide for the Con struction of one or more armored Ships and Floating Batteries, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Na-MANUFACTURER'S SUPPLIES, COTTON vy be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to appoint a board of three skilful naval officers to investigate the plans and specifications that may be submitted for the construction or completing of iron or steel clad steamships or steam batteries, and on their report, should it be favoroble, the Secretary of the Navy will cause one or more ar- manufacture of the John Whittemore Cotton mored or iron or steel clad steamships or floating steam batteries to be built; and there is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not still superintending his business. otherwise appropriated, the sum of one million five hundred thousand dollars.

CHAP. XXXIX.-An Act to amend "An Act to prohibit the sale of Spirituous Liquors and Intoxica-ting Drinks in the District of Columbia, in certain cases. Be it cnacted by the Senate and House of Repre-sentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That whenever any person shall be convicted of the offense described in the act entitled "An Act to prohibit the sale of spirituous liquors and intoxicating drinks, in the District of Columbia, in certain cases," he shall be punished by a fine of twenty dollars or imprisonment in the jail of Washington county, in the District of Columbia, for the period of thirty days. APPROVED, Agust 3, 1861.

CHAP. XL.-An Act to provide for the Purchase of Arms, Ordnance, and Ordnance Stores.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Repre-sentatives of the United States of America in Conaress assembled. That the sum of ten millions of dollars be, and the same is hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purchase and manufacture of arms, ordnance and ordnance stores. APPROVED, August 3, 1861.
