We are therefore led to believe, with all those who are earnestly and faithfully supporting the government, that Mr. Pell is not yet converted from the errors of secession, but simply aspires to be, what he has succeeded in making himself, the organ of the disaffected and mak ontented portion of the people of this state.

Should the action and spirit of the legislature be in the same direction it will greatly increase the mischief already done. It might be fatal. It is hoped the action and spirit manifested by the legislature will be so directed as rather to repair than to increase the difficulties under which the state has already placed itself.

Mr. Pell, through the columns of his newspaper, the Sentinel, contributed more than any other man in he state to bring about the result which is here characterized by the president of the United States as being of such a character as to greatly damage " the prospects of the state in the restoration of its governmental relations." The legislature, instead of seeking to repair that damage, rewards the doer of it by placing him in an honorable and lucrative position. Is this a manifestation of "action and spirit" that is calculated to "repair the difficulties under which the state has already placed itself?" We think no sane man will consider it in any way so calcula-

We regret exceedingly to see very generally manifested throughout the state a spirit in accord with that manifested by this action of the legislature. We warn the people of North Caroolina, as we have warned them before, that it is a spirit that is at war with their best interests. We warn them that they will soon have occasion to repent the blind allegiance they give to the politicians of former days, who yet seek only to protract our troubles, and whose policy will keep the state ont from the Union indefinitely.

The government of the United States, it should be remembered, has a dignity to maintain as well as the people of North Carolina. In the dignity of the United States the people of North Carolina are interested, inasmuch as they pretend to desire a union with the government of those United States, and to become themselves one of those states. But North Carolina has no government of its own. Its people, therefore, have no SPERM OIL, separate governmental dignity to maintain. When they shall have established a government, and it shall have been recognized at Washington, For sale. they may then begin to talk of their government and its dignity. At present the government of the United States is the only government having authority over them, and in its dignity alone should they have pride. If that dignity is not main. tained they, in common with the people of the For sale. whole country, must suffer mortification. Therefore it is a short sighted policy which stickles for the dignity of a few people who have no organized relations to each other, to the overthrow of the dignity of their government. We make this reference to dignity because the course pursued by the people of this and other southern states is actuated by a false sense of their position. There is no state government here. The

only government in the sou.... country to-day is that of the United States. And there can be none without the assent of the United States. Moreover, the course pursued by the people in persisting in conferring their honors upon those who are not recognized by the United States as loyal, will forever debar them from the privileges of a state government.
