HAP. XXV .-- An Act making an Appropriation for completing the Defences of Washington, and for

other Purposes. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Con- Grass, Field and Bird Seeds of every variety. gress assembled, That the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars be, and the same is hereby Bone Dust, Animal Manure, a preparation of appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury Animal Matter, Blood and Bone, a good substinot otherwise appropriated, for completing the defences of Washington: Provided, That all arrear-

ages of debts already incurred for the objects of appropriated shall be expended in any work hereafter to be commenced. SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the fifth

section of the act of twenty-eighth September, eighteen hundred and fifty, providing for the discharge from the service of minors enlisted without the consent of their parents or guardians, be, and the same hereby is repealed: Provided, That hereafter no person under the age of eighteen shall be mustered into the United States service, and the oath of enlistment taken by the recruit shall be conclusive as to his age.
SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That no vol-

unteers or militia from any State or Territory shall be musterdd into the service of the United States on any terms or conditions confining their service to the limits of said State or Territory, or their vicinities, beyond the number of ten thousand in the State of Missouri, and four thousand five hundred in the State of Maryland, heretofore authorized by the President of the United States, or Secretary of War, to be raised in said States.

And f any ship or vessel, steamship, or steam-vessel, belonging in whole or in part to citizens of the United States, and registered, enrolled, or other-wise licensed as aforesaid, shall be employed for the said purposes, or in the "coolie trade," so call-China or elsewhere, as aforesaid, any subjects of ter, Cement, Hair, Salt, Coal, &c. the Government of China for the purpose of transporting or disposing of them as aforesaid, every such ship or vessel, steamship, or steam-vessel, her tackle, apparel, furniture, and other appurtenances, shall be forfeited to the United States, and shall be liable to be seized, prosecuted, and condemned in any of the circuit courts or district courts of the United States for the district where the said ship or vessel, steamship, or steam-vessel, may be found, seized, or carried.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That every person who shall so build, fit out, equip, load, or OTTON, Naval Stores, Grain, Tobacco, Yarns, otherwise prepare, or who shall send to sea, or Sheetings, &c., navigate, as owner, master, factor, agent, or otherwise, any ship or vessel, steamship, or steam-vessel, belonging in whole or in part to citizens of the United States, or registered, enrolled, or ,licensed within the same, or at any port thereof, knowing or intending that the same shall be employed in that trade or business aforesaid, contra-ry to the true intent and meaning of this act, or in two thousand dollars and be imprisoned not ex-
