GRAIN—The wheat market is fairly active and rather easier, particularly on common qualities; the demand is chiefly for milling; sales at \$1 67 1/2 for round spring, \$1 72 1/2 for Chicago spring, \$1 80 1/2 for Milwaukee club, \$1 83 1/2 for amber do, 2 1/2 for amber State, \$2 26 1/2 for white Michigan, \$1 95 for Canadian club, and \$2 30 for white Canada. Barley is active and heavy. Oats heavy and less active. Rye is dull heavy and nominal. Corn is quiet heavy; sales of nominal at 90c at 1 1/2c; Western mixed at 82c to 87c; the latter rate for choice to store; Jersey yellow at 95c.

PROVISIONS—Pork continues in brisk demand, and prices have advanced; sales, cash and regular, at \$27 50 a 28 75 for mess, closing at \$28 12 1/2. Beef is firm and in demand, at \$12 1/2 to \$13 for plain mess, and \$14 50 a 15 75 for extra do. Three beef is firm and in fair demand. Beef hams are dull and heavy. Cured meats are nominal. Bacon is in demand, but prices are heavy. Lard is dull and nominal.

THE SOUTHERN FREEDMAN.

THE UNDERSIGNED proposes to publish, in the town of Wilmington, about the 15th of December, a weekly newspaper, to be called "The Southern Freedman." As its name indicates, this journal will be devoted to the interests of the four millions of colored freedmen now in the south, and who are without influence, property or knowledge to avail themselves advantageously of the boon which government has conferred upon them.

From the circumstances in which the close of the rebellion placed the blacks it is not expected that they will be able at present to support successfully a weekly newspaper; because they are not yet a reading people. They do not yet understand the true nature of their freedom, and are therefore exposed to imposition and deception from designing parties. The undersigned, however, hopes by discharging his duty as a public journalist, faithfully to the white and black races, to merit a share of the patronage of all philanthropists and christians, and to be able to conduct his paper in such a manner as may in the Providence of God conduce to the well-being of both races.

The undersigned being himself originally from the north, and holding his ecclesiastical connection with the Methodist Episcopal church of that section, he is well assured that he can accomplish much in behalf of the true elevation of the black race. He is aware that he possesses the confidence of the black people of this section, and as his sole aim has been to do them all the good in his power, in the past as well as the present and future, he now throws his lot with them for weal or for woe.

The Southern Freedman will be a religious as well as a secular paper, and will therefore espouse the religious and secular rights of the family of man, regardless of denominational lines. In the discharging this duty it reserves to itself the right to discuss all religious and ecclesiastical movements that may take place in the south or elsewhere, having any bearing upon the rights of the people whose organ it professes to be. It will not opportunistically promote the true interests of this people. Avoiding constantly every untimely and impracticable scheme, it will confine itself to whatever is practicable, wise and wholesome for the moral, intellectual and social elevation of the black race.

The Southern Freedman will be emphatically a paper for the negro, and the negro's family, journal—and we hope it may after awhile become read and appreciated by the more cultivated whites. At all events the undersigned believes that it will promote the interest of every employer of black men, and will do them all the good in his power, in the past as well as the present and future, he now throws his lot with them for weal or for woe.

This paper will be entirely independent of any political party or organization, and of all religious denominations, north or south. His mission is to the African on this continent regardless of parties or churches. It will, however, give its proper support to the Bureau of Freedmen, and will strive to facilitate in every way within its reach the successful workings of that benevolent and powerful institution among the blacks.

At present subscriptions will be received at Whittaker's book store, in the town of Wilmington. The Boston Recorder, New York Observer, Philadelphia Presbyterian, Presbyterian Banner, and all other religious and secular papers at the north who are friendly to the cause of African welfare are requested to give the above prospectus the proper publication at an early day. The papers of the state are also respectfully requested to do the same by us, and as usual in such cases we will return the service in kind at some future day.
