But, on the other hand, if the freedmen shall deem it to their interest to show a willingness to become useful citizens instead of drones in the hive, as we think they eventually will, and go to work cheerfully and with the determination to earn an honest living; to treat their employers with respect, and to behave themselves in a proper and becoming manner, they will always find employment among the whites, and be treated with that respect and consideration which is their due. Then there will be no need for the substitution of white labor as a general thing and the former masters of the freedmen will become their best friends, not only in giving them work and paying them for it, but by aiding them to attain to that position in the scale of human progress which their liberation from bondage has opened up before them in the future.

NEEDLESS ALARM.

There seems to be an impression in this community as well as elsewhere that there is danger of a disturbance occurring among the colored population during the Christmas holidays. We do not say that this feeling is very general in our community, and we must confess that we do not in the least share in the concern which is felt on issued. To commence at 8 o'clock. the subject. We can see no grounds for entertaining any apprehension of such a state of things, and if we did, we have confidence in the ability of the people, aided, as they would assuredly be, by the strong arm of the military, to crush any such disturbance in its inception. If the freedmen would but heed the counsel of those who are trying to lead them in the right way, there would be no occasion for any misunderstanding between the two classes of our population. PROCLAMATION,

OF NORTH CAROLINA.

WHEREAS, it has been represented to me that there is an urgent necessity in many of the counties of this State, that funds should be raised by ties of this State, that funds should be raised by taxation for the support of the poor. Now, therefore, I, W. W. HOLDEN, Provisional Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of the power vested in me, do hereby proclaim and deciare—

That a majority of the Provisional Justices of the Peace in any county in this State are hereby empowered and authorized to impose such a tax as in their judgment may be indispensable to the support of the poor; said tax to be levied, collected accounted for and used in accordance with the ed, accounted for and used in accordance with the provisions of chapter 28 and 86, Revised Code of

North Carolina. Provisional officers whose duty it is to execute the orders of the Provisional Justices, are hereby commanded to be prompt in the performance of their duty under this Proclamation.
