"The Carolina Wood Products Company, of this city, which is on the unfair list, has secured the contract for constructing the Naval Training Station at Jamestown, Va. They have been fighting organized labor a year, and in conference today refused to deal with the union. JAMES E. BARRETT,"

We are sure that the Asheville unionists will be right after these unfair contractors and it is very probable that when Secretary Daniels is informed of the unfair conditions the unions will be recognized.

However, if the Asheville unionists should fail, there is no way to the anngonistic contractors to evade the everalert officers of the American Federation of Labor. Let us all get busy and see that the Naval Training Station is constructed under fair working conditions.

## A. C. L. FEDERATED CRAFTS

Met on Tuesday and Rejected Proposition of 14 Southeastern Railroads to Grant 6 Per Cent. Increase in Wages Instead of 10 Per Cent, As Asked For by Them.

The A. C. L. Federated Crafts, composed of Boiler Makers, Blacksmiths, Machinists, Sheet Metal Workers, Electricians and Carmen, met in special session in Odd Fellows' Hall, Tuesday night, to consider a counter proposition from 14 Southeastern railroads in regard to a raise in their scale of wages. The unions have asked for a 10 per cent raise all around, and the proposition from the roads only carries an increase of 6 per cent and the eight-hour day. The matter was fully discussed and a vote taken, resulting in a unanimous rejection of the 6 per cent proposition, the unions feeling that their demand for 10 per cent was well founded, owing to the high cost of living.
