Rules and Regulations for Farm Hands. Colonel Davis, in charge of the freedmen's bureau at Clarksville, Tenn., has adopted the following rules for the government of farm laborers; and a gentleman-a large planter of the state-who has tried them during the present year, informs the Louisville Journal that they work admirably well. "Up to this time," he says, " I have not had the slightest variance with any of my employees. They are contented and happy. Knowing what is expected of them, they do it cheerfully. I

Transcript. RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR FARM HANDS, 1. Half of the wages of the employees will

be retained by the employer until the end of the contract, for its faithful performance. 2. The employees will be required to rise at daybreak, each one to feed and take care of the stock allotted to him, or perform any other business that may be assigned him; to eat their breakfast and be ready for work at the signal which will be given when the sun is half an hour high. All time lost after the signal is given will be deducted.

3. No general conversation will be allowed during working hours. 4. Bad work will be assessed at its proper

5. For disobedience, one dollar will be 6. Neglect of duty and leaving without permission will be considered disobedience. 7. No live stock will be allowed to be

raised by the employees without special con-8. Apples, peaches and melons, or any other product of the farm taken by the emplovee, without permission of the employer, will be charged for.
