Wirz-His Sentence Read to Him.

The sentence of Wirz was read to him yesterday afternoon by General Augur, commanding this Department, who proceeded to the prisoner's room, accompanied by Capt. Russell, Provost Marshal, and Capt. George R. Walbridge, commandant of the prison. General Augur, in a few words, at once informed the prisoner of the nature of his unpleasant errand, and proceeded to read the sentence.

The prisoner listened to the reading with

considerable composure, apparently having prepared himself for it, and at the conclusion remarked, "Well, I suppose it must be done." In a moment or two he looked across the passage in the direction of Gen. Briscoe's cell, which is opposite the one occupied by him, and called out to him, "General, I'm to be hung." Before the officers retired, Wirz exclaimed, "I'll haunt my persecutors " Wirz then asked that Rev. Father Boyle, of St. Peter's (Catholic) church, besent for; also, Mr. Louis Schade, his counsel, giving the number of Mr. Schade's residence. In a short time Father Boyle, who had previously visited him during his imprisonmen', was in attendance and talked to him long and earnestly in reference to the interests of his soul. Father Boyle also spent some time with the condemned man this morning. Wirz says now he knows that his duty is to attend to his spiritual interests, and wishes to make his peace with God, but it is difficult for him to forgive those whom it is his duty to forgive, but he hopes through ea nest prayer to be able before he dies to forgive all and die in peace with all man-

He now devotes himself to reading religious works, but does not spend his time in writing as formerly; his right arm, which was wounded during the year 1863, having become so painful, that it is with difficulty

that he can use it. His wife is now in Georgia, having left CARTE DE VISITES, PLAIN AND COLORED, here some weeks since to attend to her children, the person in whose care she left them, so as to be at the trial, having died while she was here. - Washington Star of Tuesday.

A Tragic Affair.

[From the Fredericksburg Herald.] The widow of William Simpson lived in this county for many years with a man named John Leech, and passed for his wife, N. B. VINCENT. but there was no marriage until within a few months before her death, when, it seems,

the public refused longer to tolerate the violation of law, and they were married. After the death of Leech's wife, he took up with her daughter, a child by her first husband, Simpson. The girl was probably eighteen at the time, and has been living in the unhallowed relation of wife for some years past, during which time she has been

the mother of two children by Leech. It seems that, notwithstanding her well known relation to Leech, she had a suitor, to whom the step-father and semi-husband objected. On Thursday night the girl and a man named Minor were to be married. That Every Grade of WALL PAPER; the best afternoon Leech met her on the road, and addressing the girl- demanded to know whether it was true that she intended marrying Minor that night. She replied that she did: whereupon Leech seized his gun, and fired. The load entering behind the left shoulder blade, passed through the breast, and was mortal, - She died in a short

> Leech was arrested, and is now in jail in this place, in the hands of the military. The parties lived some five or six mile? from town, on the Plank Road.

The following evidence of the murdered girl was taken soon after the tragic affair, by a county Magistrate, from which it appears that she had not been living with Leech at his house at the time, but had sep-

arated from him. SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY, VA., Nov. 2d, 1865.

"The following evidence of Joana Simpson was taken this day, at the house of Mrs. Virginia Leech on the Plank Road. She was lying on the bed and seemed to be in a great deal of pain, but entirely in her right

"She says she was on her way to Beverly Prior's, and while passing on the road south of the turnpike. John Leech called her to come to him; he was on the right hand side of the road in the bushes; she went to him, he asked her to sit down, and she did so. He talked to me about selling his place, and asked me if I would come and live with him again. I said no. He then asked me if I was going to be married. I said I reckon so. He said he would sell his place and put his children out. I told him not to sell his place and then blame me for it. He talked to me about my baby. I told him I wanted money but he would not give it to me. got up and said I would go; he said he would go too. He followed me and shot me in the FOREIGN & DOMESTIC SADDLERY, back. He was about ten teet behind me; he then ran towards home with his gun in his hand; it was a musket."

The Negro Insurrection in Jamaica.

The State Department has received a dispatch from the United States Consul at Kingston, Jamaica, under date of October 16, in which he alludes to the serious insurrection of the negro population in that island. There are upon the island about four hundred thousand inhabitants, of which only ten thousand are whites, about seventy-WHITE WASH AND five thousand mulattoes, and three hundred HORSE BRUSHES, and twenty five thousand blacks. The Consul expresses the belief that the present out-break has been long contemplated, and is in-tended to be a war of extermination against the whites; and the great disparity of numbers gives the former a great advantage.
