GENERAL NEWS. THE NATIONAL EXPRESS COMPANY.

The National Express Company has gone into HUNDRED FOUNTS OF TYPE; A LARGE operation with fine prospects of success, and it will at all times afford us pleasure to extend to it all the aid in our power. We, however, mention it now not for the purpose of complimenting its officers, or expressing our hopes for its prosperity, but to warn the young men of our State that they can not all obtain employment in it, as they would appear to expect. In course of time the National Express Company will, doubtless, be a large concern, giving employment to many men in different parts of the Union, but that time is not yet. In the course of the next three months there will be some two hundred appointments made to situations in it, and already there have been two thousand applications for situations. It is evident that eighteen hundred of these applicants must be disappointed, and it is our purpose in making this statement to prevent their wasting precious time, and encouraging false hopes. We would advise every young man, no matter what he may consider his chances of success, not to remain idle in dependence upon it. His chances will not be injured, but, rather we think, improved by his finding some other employment. All experience proves it to be far easier for a man in employment, no matter of what character, provided it be honest, to obtain another situation, than for the unemployed to find employment of any kind. The world will help those who are determined to help themselves, and the best evi-

dence the world can have of this disposition is to

see the man at work. We fear the number of applications for situations in the National Express Company argues too much idleness for the good of the Commonwealth. Every young man cannot, in the present state of the business of the South, obtain work congenial to his tastes and to which perhaps he was accustomed before the war; and thousands there are who were school boys when the war begun, have spent in the army the years that would have been devoted to learning some trade or useful occupation, but still there is work enough, rough it may be, for every young man in the State, and there is no reason why any should be idle. There is an universal complaint from the farmers and land owners of Virginia that the negroes will not work, and without reliable white labor the State must become a desert; and they are giving Swedes and other foreigners twelve dollars a month and their board for ordinary farm work, which is better compensation than seventy-five young men in a hundred obtained for clerical or other labor in the city in the best of times. It is very clear that for their own good, and that of the commonwealth, our young men must, for the present at least, abandon their aspirations after clerkships and turn their attention to the labors UPHOLSTERERS, PAPER HANGERS of the field.-Richmond Times.

GENERAL WADE HAMPTON The Washington correspondent of the New York Express gives the following notice of General

WADE HAMPTON: General WADE HAMPTON, who came near being elected Governor of South Carolina, is a grandson of Brigadier General WADE HAMPTON, of the Revolution and war of 1812, and a son of the late Col. WADE HAMPTON, so well known throughout the

Union to the patrons of the turf. WADE HAMPTON, the elder, was a native of Prince George County, Md., in the vicinity of Washington, and of obscure parentage. He entered the Revolutionary army as a wagon master, and from that humble position gradually arose to CHAIRS, the rank of colonel. After the war, he emigrated to South, Carolina and became a planter, and, on the acquisition of Louisiana, made such investments in that territory on the Mississippi, near New Orleans, as to render him, on his death in

> 1836, one of the richest men in the country. On the breaking out of the rebellion, the present Wade Hampton was regarded as among the richest men of the South. He was originally opposed to secession-frankly confessed that he benothing in it but ruin to himself and his relatives; but when the war commenced, embarked in it with all the impetuosity of an ardent pature, and by his gallantry and skill as a cavalry officer, soon attained the rank of Lieutenant General. In person, he is described as one of the most strikingly elegant men of the day-very tall, very classical features, and a magnificent black beard-altogeth-

> er, quite a cavalier of the Bayard order. His officers and men were devotedly attached to him, not more for his dauntless courage in the field than for those rare qualities of head and heart, for which he is equally distinguished. At the celebrated conference between Gens. SHER-MAN and JOHNSTON, in North Carolina, I am informed that WADE HAMPTON, as he sat upon his horse, formed altogether the most noticeable feature of the occasion, and attracted the unwearled admiration of the Federal soldiers present, to whom he had been previously unknown. As one of them remarked afterward, "Hampton looked as if he had stepped, horse and all, out of a canvas by Titian or Velasquez."

MODEL LEGISLATION IN TENNESSEE. The Nashville Banner, October 31, says: A bill is before the Legislature for the "relief of the people." One of its items-passed on yesterday in the House by a heavy majority-provides that where a "loyal" citizen owes a sum of money to another citizen who has aided or served the "rebellion," the amount of losses sustained by the former during the war may be taken out of the judgment of the latter.

Let us illustrate. John Dochas just come home from four years of hard fighting, without pay or profit, and is ruined. He holds a just claim of fifteen dollars against RICHARD ROE. RICHARD, like some of the members of this Legislature, happened to stay at home, and pretends now to be "true blue" all the time.
