The Death of Preston King.

The sad death of the Hon. PRESTON KING, Collector of the Port of New York, who committed suicide on Monday by drowning, excites profound regret wherever he was known. He was born in St. Lawrence Countv. N. Y., in 1806, graduated in Union College, and adopted the law as a profession. His subsequent career is sketched by the New York Express, as follows:

Alienation of mind, or insanity, was not a new thing in the life of Mr. King. When, in 1837-8, the rebellion broke out in Canada. Just received at he took an active part in exciting people in St. Lawrence County to volunteer to go over to aid the rebels. Many of his personal friends were thus involved by influence in the rebellion, some of whom were killed in a mill opposite Ogdensburg, and others transported to Botany Bay and Van Dieman's Land. Mr. King's agency in this act so preyed upon his mind that he became insane, and was sent, for quite a long time, to the lunatic asylung in Utica,

This personal friendship led to the closest intimacy after Mr. Lincoln | Sold at reduced prices, at died, and Mr. Johnson, no doubt, made him Collector of New York to represent him and his interests here in this great city. Mr. King had many personal as well as political friends, and but few if any enemies. He had a great power of attracting men to him, which generally made them carnest in securing for him high places. His natural talent was not great, and his success in life, therefore, was quite remarkable.

Mr. King was originally a democrat, and a great admirer of the late Silas Wright, for whom he voted for United States Senator in 1827. He was also one of the famous eight in the United States House of Representatives who defeated the Hon R. C. Winthrop for Speaker. In 1854 he left the democratic party, on account of their Nebraska policy, and joined the republican, by whom he was elected to the United States Senate in 1857, There he served until 1863, since which time he has been in private life, until his recent appointment to the collectorship LADIES', of New York.

The Washington Intelligencer says: Since the accession of Andrew Johnson to the Presidency he has been a large portion of the time, one of the Executive household, and undoubtedly held those intimate and confidential relations with the President which were initiated long years since by close association in Congressional life. Mr. King was once a victim of insanity, and there is not a shadow of doubt that the exactions, perplexities, anxieties, labors and responsibilities of the notorious custom house at New York again brought on that awful form of disease which has precipitated his tragic

The Secretary of the Treasury has directed C. P. Clinch, assistant collector, to fill Mr. King's position as collector of the port of New York, until otherwise ordered.

The Trials of a Confederate Journal.

The Memphis Appeal, once more issued from the city of its original location, gives the following humorous account of its perilous travels during the war

THE MEMPHIS-GRENEDA-JACKSON-ATLAN-TA-MONTGOMERY APPEAL, -As this journal has been pretty well advertised under the foregoing designation, it may interest some of our readers " on this side of the line " to be informed how it came to have so many localities as its place of publication. Being then what is now called a "rebel" sheet, it left Memphis on the morning of June 6, 1862, that pleasant little town having got into rather close proximity to General Grant's headquarters, who was seeking to make the beville, the Appeal retired to Jackson, the SPERM AND ADAMANTINE CANDLES, capital of Mississippi Hornital Sperm and ADAMANTINE CANDLES, capital of Mississippi. Here it continued until the 14th of May, 1863, when Generals Grant and Sherman took it into their heads to "occupy and possess" that snug little city. They thought they were about to "bag" the Appeal, beyond any peradventure, and their scouts had furnished them with a copy of that morning's issue, fresh and damp from the press-but they didn't. As they came in one way, the Appeal went out the other way, with full forty rounds of shot and shell making a pother over its head, before it could get out of the way of those impatient military commanders.

The Appeal then, after issuing small extras at Meridian, for about one week, cast its lines in the pleasant place of Atlanta, thinking to be out of both Grant's and Sherman's way. But here again, on the 20th of July, 1861, the last named gentleman-whom we take to be of very restless temperament gave unmistakeable indications that he wanted Atlanta likewise, and so the Appeal retired to Montgomery, Ala., continuing, however, to issue extra slips from a proof-press, until the evacuation. As General Somebody's corps marched into town one side, the proofpress, and the few cases of type retained to operate it, went out on a dray on the otherand so General Sherman and the Appeal parted for good. We believe he went off somewhere down in Georgia, and we have since learned that he and his men knocked printing offices into pi at a terrible rate, over in South Carolina. The Appeal resumed its regular publication at Montgomery on the 20th of September, 1864, and continued to entertain and instruct the denizens of "Dixie's land" until about the 12th of April, 1865, when another fierce gentleman of the Fed eral military persuasion took it into his head to ride furiously down through Alabama. He gobbled up Selma, using it very roughly, burning foundries, gun factories, and things generally of the "C. S." brand of ownership. When it was definitely ascertained that this modern Assyrian with his cohorts of

seven shooting Spencer riflemen had fixed his voracious eye on Montgomery—that is to say, about the 12th of April 1865—the Appeal made room for him by going to Columbus, Ga. From this time forward, the story without resistance, and Columbus captured by Major General Wilson, after a stout but ineffectual defence. The materials of the office, with the exception of the press and a few cases that had been forwarded to Macon, were piled in the street, and destroyed by order of Major General Wilson, who exacted of Colonel Dill, one of the proprietors who was captured with the capture of Columbus, a bond of one hundred thousand dollars not to publish the Appeal during the war, or in default to be held a prisoner. Luckily, "the war" gave out soon thereafter, and the Appeal, being now perfectly iron-clad with paroles, amnesties and pardons, is on its feet again, in robust and vigorous life."
