

SEA-FOWL GUANO DR. HAYES' OPINION OF THE B. D.

SEA-FOWL GUANO. A NALYSES OF THIS GUANO, MADE IN the way of learning the proportions of the active substances present, and their mode of From the Insurance Monitor and Wall Street changing in composition, show this Guano to be admirably adapted to the great staples of agricultural production.

The organic part consists of the excrement

of fowls, organic and soluble saits of ammonia, animal matter in a state of decay, with oily and fibrous substances, and bumns. These afford about 4 per cent of ammonia.

The soluble part contains phosphates of various bases, equal to about sistem per cent of bone phosphate of lime; while the whole phosphates present amount to 44 per cent, counted as bone phosphate of lime.

Sulphates, chlorides, and crenates of aikaline bases, make up the remaining parts of this Guano, the whole being in a condition to dissolve in the soil, and become assimilated by the crop. ditures are comparatively much lower than the general average. In all applications where the heat of fermen tation necessary to hasten the germination, and the food adapted to the growing plant in all its stages, are required, this Guano is of great value, and it may be used with confidence in making any of the staple crops of plantation culture, as a substitute for Peruvian Guano.
