NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

SECOND SESSION. SENATE. RALEIGH, Feb. 2.

The Senate was called to order at half past ten o'clock.

Mr. Wilson, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred a bill for the relief of Guardians and minor children, reported back the same and recommended that no further legislation be adopted on this subject.

By the same, to whom was referred a resolution instructing them to inquire into the expediency of passing some law empowering Executors, Administrators and Guardians to compromise claims with persons who may be indebted to their wards and estates, considered the same, and do not think any such legislation is required.

Mr. Avery, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was re-committed a bill to protect landlords against insolvent tenants, with a substitute for the same, recommended the passage of the original bill.

Mr. Cunningham from the Committee on Propositions and Grievances, to whom was referred a resolution relative to furnishing artificial limbs to disabled soldiers, proposed several amendments and recommended its passage.

Mr. McCorkle, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred a bill to better secure payment for rents, had considered the same and asked to be discharged from its further consideration.

Mr. Koonce from the Committee on Internal Improvement, to whom was referred a bill relative to the consolidation of the Atlantic and N. C. and the N. C. Railroad Companies, had considered the same and recommended its passage.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Wiggins, a bill from the Committee on Finance authorizing the issue of new bonds to the Western Railroad Company in exchange for bonds of the State, dated Oct. 1st, 1861.

On motion of Mr. Leach the rules were suspended and the bill to incorporate Newbern Lodge No. 245, A. Y. M., was taken up and passed its several readings.

A message was received from the House transmitting a communication from the Governor, relative to a correspondence with a benevolent society of ladies in the city of New York, proposing to furnish provisions to the needy of this State.

The House propose to refer the same to a joint select committee; concurred in and the Speaker designated Messrs. Harris of Franklin, Caldwell and Kelly as the Senate branch of the committee.

A message was received from the House transmitting a communication from the Governor, enclosing the report of the President and Directors of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad with a proposition to refer the same to the committee on Finance, reference made.

PRIVATE BILLS.

Bill to incorporate the Lexington Mining Company came up, was amended, and passed under the suspension of the rules.

Bill to incorporate the Fayetteville Street Railway Company, in the town of Fayetteville, came up and passed its several readings.

Bill to encourage emigration came up on its second reading, and on motion of Mr. Love, it was recommitted to the committee on Corporations.

Bill to incorporate the North Carolina Dental Association came up. On motion of Mr. Wilson it was amended. Some discussion ensued, and on motion of Mr. Leach, it was recommitted to the Committee on Corporations.

Mr. Johnston, by leave, reported a bill from the Committee on Corporations, to incorporate the American Mining and Manufacturing Company, proposing sundry amendments and recommending its passage.

On motion of Mr. Speed, the Senate adjourned until Monday 10 o'clock.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The House was called to order at 10 o'clock. A message was received from the Governor transmitting a report from the President and Directors of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad Company. Sent to the Senate with a proposition to print.

By Mr. Patton, a bill for a Mechanic's Lien Law.

By Mr. McNair, a bill to extend the corporate limits of the town of Lumberton.

By Mr. Garrett, a bill to change the location of the county site of Haywood county. UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The House proceeded to consider the Revenue bill, on its third reading. Sundry amendments were offered, discussed and rejected. Pending the consideration of the bill, the hour arrived for the special order, viz: The appointment of additional Justices of the Peace. A number of nominations were made and transmitted to the Senate for concurrence.

An engrossed bill to enable the city of Wilmington to provide for the payment of its debts, had its first reading and then, on motion of Mr. McNair, the House adjourned.

As a specimen of the working of our labor system in the South, under the superintendence of Government officials, we extract the following paragraph from the Columbus Sun:

DIFFICULT TO HIRE.—There is a large number of negroes in our city. Many farmers are here anxious to secure their services, but find great difficulty in doing so. Not a few have left in disgust. Some negroes appear willing to go West where crowds have gone. A few of the brethren have established regular brokerages to hire hands. The Bureau is making a "fat thing" in approving contracts. The charges are by no means light, and if officers do not get rich, it will not be for want of an extortionate spirit.—How country negroes expect to subsist in Columbus, without stealing, we are unable to imagine.

SEA-FOWL GUANO.

DR. HAYES' OPINION OF THE B. D. SEA-FOWL GUANO.

ANALYSES OF THIS GUANO, MADE IN the way of learning the proportions of the active substances present, and their mode of changing in composition, show this Guano to be admirably adapted to the great staples of agricultural production.

The soluble part consists of the excrement of fowls, organic and soluble salts of ammonia, animal matter in a state of decay, with oily and fibrous substances, and humus. These all add abundance of nutriment.

The soluble part contains phosphates of various bases, equal to about sixteen per cent of bone phosphate of lime; while the whole phosphates present amount to 44 per cent, counted as bone phosphate of lime.

Sulphates, chlorides, and oxides of alkaline bases, make up the remaining parts of this Guano, the whole being in a condition to dissolve in the soil, and become assimilated by the crop.

It will be seen that phosphoric acid, equal to about sixteen per cent of bone phosphate of lime, dissolves freely in water, and that the forty four per cent, of bone phosphate is all soluble in water and time being allowed. With these phosphates there will be about twelve per cent of organic compounds, affording food for the soil.

Compared with Peruvian Guano, the latter appears as a saline, caustic substance, and is adapted to hastening forward a crop in a backward season, or to excite the production of grain. It cannot be used in consecutive seasons, as the B. D. Sea-Fowl Guano can be, as the latter leaves for fertilizing matter in the soil, and is applied, and thus adds permanent value to the land.

The exact balance found between the soluble phosphates, of different bases, and the ammonia present, as well as the condition of the less soluble phosphates, is a most important feature in this Guano, and one which places it by the side of Peruvian Guano.

In all applications where the heat of fermentation necessary to hasten the germination, and the food adapted to the growing plant in all its stages, are required, this Guano is of great value, and it may be used with confidence in fertilizing any of the staple crops of plantation culture, as substitute for Peruvian Guano.
