WILMINGTON, FEBRUARY 6, 1867. NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE. SECOND SESSION. SENATE. RALEIGH, Feb. 4.

The Senate was called to order at half past ten o'clock. REPORT OF COMMITTEES. Mr. Cunningham from the Committee on Propositions and Grievances to whom was referred a petition from the justices of the peace of New Hanover county, reported by him recommending its passage.

RESOLUTION AND BILLS. Mr. Hall, a resolution to amend the 3d sec. of the 7th clause of the Revised Code, instructing the Judiciary Committee to consider the same; adopted.

Mr. Hall, a bill to increase the fees of the inspectors of naval stores in the city of Wilmington, referred to the Committee on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Love, a bill to incorporate the North Carolina Express Company, ordered to be printed and referred to the Committee on Corporations.

Mr. Gash, a bill to amend an act prescribing the duties of Clerks issuing marriage licenses, referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Mr. Battle, a resolution proposing to send a message to the House asking their concurrence in the resolution providing that no new resolution or bill shall be introduced or considered from and after Friday the 15th of this month. Mr. speed moved to lay the resolution on the table, not agreed to, and on the passage of the resolution the yeas and nays were called, and the resolution was adopted by a vote of 27 to 10. Mr. Hall moved to reconsider the vote; agreed to.

Mr. Hall then moved to amend by striking out Friday and inserting Monday next. Mr. Love moved to lay the amendment with the resolution on the table; not agreed to; and the amendment was adopted and the resolution passed as amended.

Bill to amend the Constitution of the State of North Carolina came up and on motion of Mr. Barry, its further consideration was postponed for the present, and made the special order for Friday next at 12 o'clock.

Bill to establish a penitentiary in this State, having been made the special order for 12 o'clock, was taken up, and on motion of Mr. Gash, was read by sections, sundry amendments were adopted, and the bill passed its second reading.

Bill to be entitled an act to consolidate the Atlantic and N. C. Railroad Company, the N. C. R. R. Company and the Western N. C. R. R. Company, came up on the second reading. On motion of Mr. Love, its further consideration for the present was postponed and made the special order for Monday next at 12 o'clock.

HOUSE OF COMMONS. RALEIGH, Feb. 4. The House met at 10 o'clock. Mr. McKay presented a memorial from the President and Directors of the Fayetteville and Florence Railroad Company. Referred.

Mr. Cowan, a memorial from citizens of New Hanover county, accompanied by a bill to change the mode of appointing authorities in the city of Wilmington. Referred.

Mr. Kenan, from the Judiciary Committee, reported back favorably a bill in relation to set off, and unfavorably a bill to extend the time for the registration of deeds, &c.

The House proceeded to consider a bill to transfer the Land Scrip donated by the United States for an Agricultural College. (As pertinent to the matter under consideration, Mr. McKay submitted a report from a special committee, to which had been referred a memorial from the Trustees of the University.

This report recommended a transfer of the scrip, or an appropriation of the interest arising therefrom, to the University of Chapel Hill, for the establishment of an Agricultural College.)

Mr. Davis moved to amend the bill as follows: "Be it further enacted, that it be the privilege of the county court, in each county in the State, forever, to select annually one native of the State, resident in said county, of good moral character and capacity for usefulness, without the requisite means to defray the expenses of education, who shall be admitted to any classes in the University, for which he may be prepared, free of all charges for tuition and room rent, so that each county may always have one representative in the institution.")

Mr. Davis addressed the House in support of the bill, urging the peculiar claims of Chapel Hill, and the advantage to be derived from a transfer of the scrip to that institution.

Mr. McKay offered a bill to establish an Agricultural and Mechanical College at the University of North Carolina, and for the relief of the University, as a substitute for the bill under discussion.

Mr. Davis opposed the substitute chiefly for the reason that it made the Public Treasurer the Trustee of this fund. This, though not intended as such, was a reflection upon the Trustees of the University. Besides, the Treasurer's duties were multifarious, and he would not devote that exclusive attention to the interests of this fund which they would constantly demand. He also opposed the substitute because of the appropriation in advance of \$7,000 which it proposed.

Mr. Cowan addressed the House in support of the original bill, and read from the act of Congress donating the scrip, to show that the State should act definitely upon this matter at the present session. He adverted to the facts that the State had no power to divert this fund from its original purpose, or to place it beyond its own control, and argued that the University being the only institution under the control of the State, the Land scrip must be bestowed upon it, or else, another institution must be now created to receive this endowment, and effect the objects proposed.

The question recurring upon the substitute, it was rejected. Yeas 33 nays 65. The amendment offered by Mr. Davis, was adopted.

Mr. Moore, of Hertford, offered an amendment diverting escheats from the University and donating them heretofore to other colleges in the State.

Mr. Hodnett opposed both bill and amendment. The amendment was rejected. On motion of Mr. Harper, the bill was amended by providing that pupils may be admitted to the branches of Agriculture and Mechanical arts, who possess the requisite qualifications for those studies, without requiring the previous Literary training requisite for admission into the regular college courses.

The bill was further amended by adding the following provision: "Provided, That the University shall comply with the act of Congress, and make its leading object to teach such branches of learning as are related to Agriculture and the Mechanical arts, without excluding other scientific studies and including Military Tactics."

The bill as amended, passed its second reading.

A bill to exchange a certain amount of stock in the N. C. Railroad, with the Cheraw and Coalfields Railroad Company, and for other purposes, was taken up on motion of Mr. Dargan, who addressed the House, explaining its purpose and urging its passage. The bill passed its second reading.

Messages were received from the Governor in relation to the Literary Fund; and to the investigation of the affairs of the Cape Fear and Deep River Navigation Company, sent to the Senate with a proposition to refer.

Mr. Chadwick introduced a bill to establish a criminal court in the city of Newbern. By Mr. Baker, a bill to incorporate the town of Rocky Mount, in Edgecombe county.

The House then adjourned.

SEA-FOWL GUANO. DR. HAYES' OPINION OF THE B. D. SEA-FOWL GUANO. ANALYSES OF THIS GUANO, MADE IN the way of learning the proportions of the active substances present, and their mode of change in composition, show this Guano to be admirably adapted to the great staples of agricultural production.

The organic part consists of the excrement of birds, and soluble salts of ammonia, animal matter in a state of decay, with oily and fibrous substance, and humus. These afford about 4 per cent of ammonia.

The soluble part contains phosphates of various bases, equal to about sixteen per cent of bone phosphate of lime; while the whole phosphates present amount to 44 per cent, counted as bone phosphate of lime.

Saltpetre, chloride, and emanates of alkaline bases, make up the remaining parts of this Guano, the whole being in a condition to dissolve in the soil, and become assimilated by the crop. This Guano has a fermentative power, and will not only induce this action, but it will excite the humates in the soil to render up any ammonia they contain.

It will be seen that phosphoric acid, equal to about three per cent of bone phosphate of lime, dissolves freely in water, and that the forty four per cent of bone phosphate is all soluble, moisture and time being allowed. With these phosphates there will be about twelve per cent of organic compounds, affording four per cent of pure ammonia, apart from that obtained from humus compounds. These are proportions which experience has demonstrated as forming a well balanced Guano, of special value in cotton cultivation, and also adapted to other crops.

Compared with Peruvian Guano, the latter appears to be a saline, cooling Guano, well adapted to induce forward a crop in a backward season, or to excite the production of grass. It can not be used in consecutive seasons, as the B. D. Sea-Fowl Guano can be, as the latter leaves for a long time in the soil, and its application and this adds permanent value to the land.

The exact balance found between the soluble phosphates, of different bases, and the ammonia produced, as well as the condition of the insoluble phosphates, is a most important feature in this Guano, and one which places it by the side of Peruvian Guano.

In all applications where the best of fermentation is necessary to hasten the germination, and the food adapted to the growing plant in all its stages, are required, this Guano is of great value, and may be used with confidence in making any of the staple crops of production culture, as substitute for Peruvian Guano.
