NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

SECOND SESSION.

SENATE.

RALEIGH, Feb. 5. The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock A. M.

Mr. Richardson presented a memorial from the citizens of Monroe county, in the proceedings of a public meeting held in that county, praying that the General Assembly will pass some bill, for the protection of the debtor and to protect property sold under execution. Referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Cunningham, from the committee on Propositions and Grievances, to whom was referred a memorial relative to emigration, reported that they had maturely considered the subject and that it was one of importance, but that private capital could not accomplish the purposes contemplated, they believe the financial condition of the State will not justify any expenditure of public funds to secure it. They, therefore, adhere to a former report on the subject, and ask to be discharged from its further consideration.

Mr. Moore, from the committee on the Judiciary to whom was referred a bill to amend and re-enact an act, to change the jurisdiction of the Courts and the rules of pleading therein, reported that having considered the subject in the former bill, ask to be discharged from its further consideration.

Mr. McCorkle, from the committee on Judiciary, to whom was referred a bill to prevent unnecessary costs on official bonds, considered the same and recommended that it do not pass.

Mr. Speed, from the committee of Insane Asylum, who was instructed to report on all out-standing claims, held that the claims were just and should be paid, and recommended the passage of a resolution making an appropriation to pay the same.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Kelly, a bill to amend the charter of the Wilmington Railway Bridge Company, referred to the committee on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. McLean, a bill to set apart and perpetuate McLean cemetery in the county of Cumberland.

By the same, from the Committee on Finance, a bill to authorize the issue of new bonds in place of bonds issued by the State for the benefit of the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad in 1862.

Mr. Cowles, a bill authorizing the President of the Western Railroad Company to borrow money on the faith and credit of the State, referred to the Committee on Internal Improvements.

Mr. Avery, a bill to incorporate the North-western Railroad Company. On his motion was referred to the Committee on Internal Improvements, and on motion of Mr. Harri-son, of Rutherford, it was ordered to be printed.

A message was received from the House transmitting a message from the Governor covering a report from the Attorney General relating to the Cape Fear Navigation Company, proposing to refer the same to a Joint Select Committee; concurred in, and the Speaker designated Messrs. Hall, Williams and Lloyd as the Senate branch of the Committee.

STAY LAW.

Bill to change the jurisdiction of the Courts and the rules of pleading therein, having been made the special order for 12 o'clock, was taken up and read by sections, sundry amendments were adopted, and Mr. Moore offered a substitute for the whole and urged its adoption. Mr. Leach favored the original bill, and at the close of his remarks, moved that all the bills on this subject be recommitted to the Joint Select Committee on the judicial system. Mr. McLean thought the idea a good one, but feared action on this subject would be delayed too long if the reference is made. Mr. Covington favored the substitute offered by Mr. Moore, and preferred immediate action. Mr. Avery proposed to amend the motion to refer, by limiting the Committee, at farthest, to report by Friday next, and the motion to recommit was withdrawn. Mr. Wiggins thought it proper to refer the bill, and Mr. Jones renewed the motion to refer. The question on its recommitment recurring, the ayes and nays were called, and the motion to recommit was carried, by a vote of 25 to 15.

The bill to protect Landlords against insolvent tenants, was taken up, the question being put on the adoption of the substitute for the original bill, pending its discussion, on motion of Mr. Avery, the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

RALEIGH, Feb. 5. The House was called to order at half-past ten o'clock.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

By Mr. Waugh, a resolution authorizing the Governor to pay freight on supplies furnished by benevolent societies.

By Mr. Wilson, a resolution instructing an inquiry by the Judiciary Committee, as to the expediency of legislation to authorize Executors, &c., in certain cases, to sell notes of hand, bonds, &c., belonging to their estates.

By Mr. Cowan, a bill to incorporate the Wilmington Institute, and a bill to incorporate the National Loan and Trust Company.

By Mr. Autry, a bill allowing debtors the privilege of paying their old debts in State Bank Money, or its equivalent in current funds. (This bill was made the special order for Thursday, the 7th inst., at 12 o'clock, M.)

By Mr. Hutterby, a bill extending the jurisdiction of the Justices of the Peace. By Mr. McKay a bill to amend "an act concerning negroes, and persons of color, or of mixed blood."

Also, a bill to amend chapter 62, section 16, Revised Code, so as to compel the return of Executions issued by Justices of the Peace. By Mr. Peebles, a bill to abolish usury; and a bill to change the tenure of the office of Sheriff.

Mr. Reas presented a memorial from the Mayor and Commissioners of the city of Raleigh, praying relief from a prospective nuisance on Union square. Referred to the Committee on Propositions and Grievances, under protest from the chairman of said committee.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The House resumed consideration of the Revenue bill on its third reading. Section 1st of schedule A, was amended on motion of Mr. Logan by providing for the deduction of the gross amount of expenses in listing income tax.

Section 9, of the same schedule, was amended on motion of Mr. Morehead by exempting from taxation vessels of more than 5 tons burthen.

Sec. 14, of class 3, schedule A, was amended on motion of Mr. Harding, by providing, in addition to the tax on pistols, dirks, &c., that on failure to pay said tax, the weapon shall be forfeited, and sold by the Sheriff, the proceeds of sale to be appropriated to the county fund.

Section 14, of schedule B, was amended on motion of Mr. Durham, by striking out the tax of ten cents per gallon on brandy distilled from fruit.

Mr. Perry, of Wake, moved to strike out the whole of section 14, which taxes distilled liquors. Not agreed to.

Pending further consideration of the Revenue bill the House adjourned.

The report of the Attorney General, read in the House yesterday, was relative to an investigation of the affairs of "the Cape Fear Navigation Company," instead of "the Cape Fear and Deep River Navigation Company," as erroneously stated. This report was highly favorable to the company.
