NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

SECOND SESSION. SENATE. RALEIGH, Feb. 6.

The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Wilson, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred an Enrolled bill from the House, to abolish imprisonment for debt, considered the same and recommended that it do not pass.

Mr. McCorkle, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred a bill to change the jurisdiction of the Courts and the manner of pleading therein, asked to be discharged from its further consideration, and, on motion of Mr. Matthews, it was referred to the Committee on the Judicial System.

Mr. Avery, from the Committee on Internal Improvements to whom was referred a bill authorizing the President of the Western Railroad Company to borrow money on the faith and credit of the State, recommended its passage. Also a bill amending the charter of the Wilmington Railway Company, recommending its passage.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS. Mr. Hill, a bill to incorporate the Agricultural and Mineral Land Company. Referred to the Committee on Corporations.

On motion of Mr. Harris, ofutherford, the rules were suspended and the bill abolishing imprisonment for debt was taken up and made the special order for Tuesday next.

A resolution relative to Common Schools, having been made the special order, came up, and on motion of Mr. Hill, its consideration was postponed for the present, and it was placed on the calendar.

A bill to protect Landlords against insolvent tenants came up on its third reading, the question being on striking out the original bill and substitute another, sundry amendments to the original bill were adopted, and considerable discussion ensued; the question on striking out being put, the yeas and nays were called, and the Senate refused to strike out. Mr. Jones then offered another substitute, the question being to strike out and insert, the yeas and nays were called and the motion was lost. The question recurring on its final passage, the yeas and nays were called and the bill passed, by a vote of 39 to 10.

A bill making provision for the payment of the bonds of the State now due, and the interest on the State debt, was taken up and read by sections, various amendments were adopted. Before coming to a vote.

Mr. Paschal moved to adjourn until tomorrow at 10 o'clock. Mr. Hill moved to amend by striking out 10 1/2 to-morrow and insert 7 1/2 to-night, which motion was lost, and the Senate adjourned until half past ten o'clock to-morrow.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

RALEIGH, February 6. The House was called to order at 10 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. McClammy, the bill to amend the act authorizing the establishment of "Work-houses and Houses of Correction," which was the special order for 11 o'clock to-day, was postponed and made the special order for twelve o'clock, M., on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Kenan, the use of the Hall of the House of Commons was granted to Mr. Farrar, of Virginia, in which to deliver a lecture to-morrow evening.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Dargan, from the Judiciary Committee, reported a bill to amend chap. 48, sec. 51, of the Revised Code, making real estate liable to the payment of widow's years allowance. This bill passed its several readings under a suspension of the rules.

By Mr. Richardson, from the same committee, reported back adversely a bill to change the tenure of the office of Sheriff; and favorably, a bill to amend an act in relation to negroes, and persons of color or mixed blood; a bill to amend an act, and a bill to amend chap. 82, sec. 18, Revised Code, so as to compel the return of executions issued by Justices of the Peace.

By Mr. Davis, from the same committee, reported back "the bill to protect property sold under execution from sacrifice," favorably with amendment.

Mr. McNair, from the Committee on Corporations, reported back favorably a bill to incorporate the N. C. Land Agency, for the encouragement of immigration; a bill to incorporate the Wilmington Institute; a bill to incorporate the Trustees of Table Rock Seminary; and a bill to incorporate the town of Rocky Mount. (This bill passed its several readings under a suspension of the rules.)

Mr. Waugh, for a Select Committee, reported a resolution appropriating \$5,000 to the payment of freight on supplies sent to this State by Benevolent Societies of other States.

On motion of Mr. Woodard, the rules were suspended and the resolution put on its several readings.

Mr. Henry moved to amend the resolution by striking out "\$5,000" and substituting therefor \$2,500.

Messrs. Kenan and Waugh opposed the amendment, and the question recurring, it was rejected.

Mr. Logan moved to amend by providing for a distribution of the supplies received among the several counties of the State in proportion to their population.

Messrs. Waugh and Dargan opposed this amendment, there being greater destitution in some counties than in others.

The amendment was rejected.

Mr. Blair offered an amendment making the appropriation \$3,000. Rejected.

Mr. Logan offered an amendment providing for a distribution of the supplies, upon statements furnished by the several County Courts, as to the number of destitute persons in their respective counties. This amendment was also rejected, after discussion, and the resolution, without amendment, passed 24 and 38 readings.

By Mr. Queen, on tax writs, warrants and executions in civil cases, on debts contracted prior to the 1st day of May, 1867.

By Mr. Kenan, a bill to incorporate the Dublin Manufacturing Company.

By Mr. Russ, a bill to amend the charter

of the N. C. Mutual Life Insurance Company and a bill to amend the charter of the N. C. Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

By Mr. Kendall, a bill to incorporate the Wake-bon Savings Institution.

By Mr. —, a resolution allowing mileage to officers and members of the General Assembly for the adjourned session.

By Mr. Crawford, of Marion, a joint resolution that the General Assembly adjourn sine die on Monday, the 18th inst. (This resolution passed the House, and was sent to the Senate for concurrence.)

EXPENSES BUSINESS.

The House resumed the consideration of the Revenue bill on its 3d reading.

The only material amendment adopted on this reading, was the following offered by Mr. Durham, as section 7, under the head of exemptions:

The property and polls of all persons who have lost an arm, leg, hand or foot in the military, naval or marine service of the State, or of the late Confederate States, or who have been disabled from performing ordinary manual labor by any other wound, or any disease or accident in said service, also the property of the widows of all persons who have served their lives in said service: Provided, that the property exempted of each person herein included, shall not exceed two hundred and fifty dollars in value; and provided further, that the excess over two hundred and fifty dollars in value of the property of all such persons, shall be subject to taxation as other property. And it shall be the duty of the County Courts in the several counties of the State, upon motion, to examine the claims of all persons claiming the benefits of the foregoing section, and upon proof that they are included within its provisions, to grant certificates of exemption to such persons, which certificates shall be in the form prescribed by the Clerk, and he shall receive no fee therefor.

(This amendment when first introduced, proposed to exempt \$500 worth of property, but was modified at the instance of Mr. Morehead, so reducing the amount exempted to \$250.)

The question recurring on the passage of the bill on its 3d reading, Mr. Logan moved its reference to the Finance Committee with instructions to report a bill to raise revenue adequate only to the ordinary expenses of the State.

Mr. Logan said that he did not object to the principle of the bill, or the subjects of taxation, but he objected to the "treasurer's estimate of \$1,100,000," which he wished to meet the ordinary expenses of the two fiscal years, ending September 1868. He was therefore opposed to the merits and opposed the taxation proposed in the bill.

Mr. Harper defended the bill and opposed the motion to refer.

The House refused to refer, and the bill passed its 3d reading, yeas 27, nays 27.

The House then adjourned.

SEA-FOWL GUANO.

DR. HAYES' OPINION OF THE B. D. SEA-FOWL GUANO.
