NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE.

SECOND SESSION. SENATE. RALEIGH, Feb. 13.

The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock. Mr. Brown, from the Committee on the Judiciary, to whom was referred a bill in favor of widows, recommended that it do not pass.

Mr. Gash, a bill authorizing the appointment of a clerk with a salary of \$700 to the Comptroller of the State, referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Hall, a bill relative to Inspectors for the city of Wilmington, referred to the Committee on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Love, a bill to harmonize and give through freight on the various railroads in this State, referred to the Committee on Internal Improvements.

On motion of Mr. McCorkle, the rules were suspended, and the bill relative to supplying artificial arms to disabled soldiers, and for other purposes, was taken up on its third reading and passed.

On motion of Mr. Hall, the rules were suspended, and the private calendar was taken up.

On motion of Mr. Hall, the Senate resolved themselves into a Committee of the Whole. Mr. Wilson in the chair, in order to consider the bill to lay off and establish the county of Vance, to be composed of portions of Craven and Beaufort counties.

Mr. Speed moved to amend by striking out the word "Vance" and insert "Pamlico." Agreed to. A discussion of some length ensued. Messrs. Manly, Hall, Speed and Berry opposed the bill, and Messrs. Thompson, Jones and Covington supported it.

On motion of Mr. Manly, the committee arose and reported progress. The Speaker resumed the chair, and the Chairman, Mr. Wilson, reported adversely to the bill.

Mr. Hall offered an amendment to the bill, leaving the decision of the matter to the people of Craven and Beaufort, which was rejected.

The question arising upon the passage of the bill on its second reading, and the yeas and nays being called, the bill was rejected, by the casting vote of the Speaker, yeas 19, nays 19, and the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF COMMONS. RALEIGH, Feb. 13.

The House was called to order at 10 o'clock, A. M. Mr. Allen, from the Judiciary Committee, reported a substitute for the bill to amend Section 21, chapter 34, Revised Code.

Mr. Kenan, from the same committee, favorably, a bill for the protection of Guardians.

By Mr. Woodward, a bill to authorize a special Court for the county of Wilson.

By Mr. Allen, a bill for the protection of Grape Growers.

By Mr. Horton of Watauga, a bill to amend an act to encourage the raising of sheep in the counties of Watauga and Ashe.

By Mr. Hutcheson, a bill to incorporate the N. C. Orphan Asylum.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS. The House resumed consideration of the bill to authorize the Public Treasurer to negotiate a loan for the relief of the Treasury and to establish a N. C. Savings Bank.

Mr. Williams, of Martin, renewed his motion to lay the bill on the table. Not agreed to.

Mr. Morehead offered amendments reducing the loan to \$5,000,000, and striking out the 18th section of the bill, in relation to funding. He then moved a re-commitment of the bill to the Finance Committee.

Mr. McKay thought the amendment would defeat the loan, but was willing that the bill should be re-committed. He hoped however that it would be considered in full committee.

The motion to recommit was adopted.

SPECIAL ORDER. The House proceeded to consider the bill to amend the charter of the Western N. C. Railroad company.

This bill after discussion and amendment, passed 2d and 3d readings.

Mr. Waugh, by leave, introduced a bill to stay executions in courts of Record.

Mr. Everett, a bill to allow persons who bear arms on leg in the service of the late Confederate States to retail spirituous Liquors by a measure less than a quart, with out paying any License.

By Mr. Kelsey, a resolution instructing inquiry by the Judiciary Committee as to the expediency of passing a general law for the relief of Sheriffs. Laid on the table, on motion of Mr. Lasham of Washington.

By Mr. Clark, a bill authorizing the sale of a part of the land belonging to the Vine Hill Academy in the county of Halifax.

By Mr. Teague, a bill concerning creditors.

By Mr. Wilson, of Perquimans, a bill authorizing the County Courts of Perquimans to elect county officers.

By Mr. Richardson, a bill to authorize the exchange of certain bonds issued during the war, for internal improvement purposes, for new bonds.

ON CALENDAR. A bill to amend an act to regulate salaries and fees, passed second and third readings.

A bill to convert the debt due the State from the Atlantic & N. C. R. R. Co., into capital stock, passed its second reading.

A bill concerning Surveyors.

A bill to authorize certain counties to subscribe for stock in the Cheraw and Coastal Railroad company.

A bill to pay the Jurors for their services in the trial of capital felonies, and.

A bill to amend an act to extend the time for perfecting title land, passed second and third readings.

Bills placing physicians services and accounts on an equal dignity with bonds; to regulate and change the fees of County Court Solicitors; in aid of the Literary Fund; for the relief of Wards; to establish Homesteads; to punish unlawful hunting, and to change

the time for the meeting of the General Assembly, were laid on the table on second reading.

A resolution allowing mileage to officers and members of the Legislature, for the adjourned session, passed second and third readings.

A resolution, introduced by Mr. Holderby, providing for joint informal consideration by the two Houses, of the plan of reconstruction recently proposed by Govs. Orr, Sharkey and others, was referred to the Committee on Federal Relations.

The House then adjourned.

DR. HAYES' OPINION OF THE B. D. SEA-FOWL GUANO. ANALYSES OF THIS GUANO, MADE IN the way of learning the proportions of the active substances present, and the effect of changing in composition, show this Guano to be admirably adapted to the great staples of agricultural production.

The organic part consists of the excrement of fowls, organic and soluble salts of ammonia, animal matter in a state of decay, with oily and fibrous substances, and humus. These afford about 4 per cent. of ammonia.

The soluble part contains phosphates of various bases, equal to about sixteen per cent. of bone phosphate of lime; while the whole phosphates present amount to 44 per cent., counted as bone
