SEA-FOWL GUANO DR. HAYES' OPINION OF THE B. D. SEA-FOWL GUANO. A NALYSES OF THIS GUANO, MADE IN the way of learning the proportions of the active substances present, and their mode of

changing in composition, show this Guano to be admirably adapted to the great staples of agricultural production. The organic part consists of the excrement of fowls, organic and soluble salts of ammonia, animal matter in a state of decay, with oily and fibrous substances, and humus These afford

about 4 per cent of ammonia.

The soluble part contains phosphates of various bases, equal to about sixteen per cent of bone phosphate of lime; while the whole phosphates present amount to 41 per cent, counted as bone phosphate of lime.
