NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE. SECOND SESSION. Evening Session. SENATE.

RALEIGH, Feb. 21. The following bills on the Calendar were taken up and disposed of as follows:

REJECTED ON SECOND READING. Bill to amend an act to more effectually secure the maintenance of bastard children. Bill for the relief of guardians and minor children.

Bill fixing the fees of County Solicitors in certain cases. INDEFINITELY POSTPONED. Bill to change the jurisdiction of the courts and the rules of pleading therein.

Bill to better secure the payment of rents. Bill to prevent unnecessary costs in suits on official bonds. LAID ON THE TABLE. Bill to re-enact and amend an ordinance to change the jurisdiction of the courts and the rules of pleading therein.

Bill authorizing the issue of new bonds for bonds issued to the Western N. C. Railroad. Bill concerning Justices of the Peace for New Hanover county.

Bill to increase the fees of inspectors of naval stores in the city of Wilmington. Bill authorizing the issue of new bonds for bonds issued to the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad company.

Bill to incorporate the Northwestern Railroad company was amended and passed its several readings. Bill to protect certain interests of the Common Schools, and for other purposes, passed its several readings.

The Senate adjourned. Evening Session. HOUSE OF COMMONS. RALEIGH, Feb. 21.

The House concurred in Senate amendments to the resolution of adjournment. PASSED SECOND AND THIRD READINGS. Bill to extend the regular terms of the County Court of Granville.

Bill to secure the better drainage of the lowlands on Lower River in Caldwell county. Bill to consolidate the Fire Companies of the city of Newbern.

INDEFINITELY POSTPONED. Bill to repeal an ordinance of the Convention, authorizing the exchange of stocks in the Railroad companies for State bonds. Bill for the relief of the people.

Bill to compensate Justices of the Peace in Lincoln county. Mr. Murrill, by leave, introduced a bill to regulate the cultivation of oysters, which passed its several readings, under a suspension of the rules.

A bill to protect property sold under execution from sacrifice, was put on its second reading. The question being first upon the adoption of an amendment proposed by the Committee on the Judiciary, Mr. Holderly moved to amend the amendment, by adding a proviso, that the property sold under execution shall bring its full value, instead of three-fourths of its value, as proposed in the bill. Rejected.

The amendment was adopted, and the bill passed its second, and then its third reading, yeas, 75; nays 18. The House then adjourned.

SENATE. RALEIGH, Feb. 22. The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock A. M.

Mr. Berry, a bill for the relief of the people, by authorizing the issue of bills of credit to defray the expenses of the State Government.

Mr. McLean, a bill to increase the capital stock of the Clarendon Bridge Company. Filed.

Mr. McRae, a bill authorizing Justices of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions of the county of Robeson, to appoint a special Magistrate. Filed.

A message was received from the House proposing to rescind the joint order on adjournment.

Mr. Wilson moved that the Senate concur, and on his motion, the yeas and nays were called and the motion prevailed by a vote of 21 to 15.

On motion of Mr. Wiggins, the rules were suspended and the bill authorizing the Commissioners of the town of Halifax to grant the right of way to the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad Company through said town, was taken up and passed its several readings.

Mr. Cowan introduced a resolution, by leave, proposing that both Houses adjourn on the 4th of March, to meet again on the 1st of August. Mr. Outlaw moved to amend by striking out 1st of August and insert sine die, pending its consideration, the hour arrived for the

SPECIAL ORDER. Bill to be entitled an act to enable the Western Railroad Company to extend its road across the North Carolina Railroad to the Virginia line, near Mt. Airy, in the county of Surry, was taken up. Messrs. Leach, Cowles and McLean urged the passage of the bill, and opposed it in its present form. It was agreed to pass the bill on its second reading with a view of amending it on its third reading, and on motion of Mr. Cowles, it was made a special order for to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Paschall, the Senate adjourned until 7 1/2 o'clock, P. M.

HOUSE OF COMMONS. RALEIGH, Feb. 22. The House was called to order at 10 o'clock A. M.

Mr. Patton, from the Committee on Internal Improvements, reported back favorably, a bill to aid the Wilmington & Tarboro' Railroad company; a bill to amend the charter of the Wilmington Railway Bridge company.

BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS. Mr. Morehead introduced a resolution to rescind the joint order for adjournment. After some discussion the resolution to re-

scind was adopted, and sent to the Senate for concurrence. SPECIAL ORDER. A bill to confine original jurisdiction of all crimes and misdemeanors, below capital felonies, to the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions, was put on its second reading and passed.

The rules were suspended, sundry amendments were offered, and the bill was re-committed to the Judiciary Committee. The Senate, by message, concurred in the resolution to rescind the joint order for adjournment.

SPECIAL ORDER NO. 2. A bill to regulate assignments and protect creditors. Discussed at length and re-committed to the Judiciary Committee.

The House resumed consideration of the unfinished business. The bill was amended and then passed its 3rd reading. [Authorizes Sheriffs to settle intestate estates in certain cases.]

An engrossed bill to incorporate the Northwestern Railroad Company, passed its several readings under a suspension of the rules.

ON CALENDAR. A bill explanatory of the act granting general amnesty and pardon; a bill to amend an act to prevent enticing servants from fulfilling their contracts or harboring them; and a bill for the relief of purchasers of vacant lands in Macon county, passed second and third readings.

A bill for the relief of Executors and Administrators, and a bill to amend "an act to extend the time for the registration of deeds," &c., were laid on the table.

A resolution to compensate Judges holding Courts of Oyer and Terminer, was rejected on second reading. The House then adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.
