

The Queen is thirty-one, and has two daughters and a son. The sister of the King is Princess Charlotte, Empress of Mexico; her brother, Count de Flanders, has just married a princess of the royal family of Prussia. His Majesty has already visited Paris and the Exhibition, on his way to St. Petersburg, where he is about to marry a niece of the Emperor of Russia.

Queen Maria, of Portugal, daughter of Victor Emanuel, took up her abode at the Palais Royal. She is twenty years of age, and married in 1862 King Dom Luis I., by whom she has two children. Like the Queen of the Belgians, her skill as a horsewoman is much praised, and she is a bold and dexterious rider in the hunting field. Hence her admirers have given her the ap-

pellation of "Queen Diana." Prince Oscar, who has frequently visited the Exhibition, is the second son of King Oscar I., and the grandson of the Marshal of France, Bernadotte, brother-in-law of Joseph Bonaparte, and King of Sweden in 1818. Prince Oscar, brother of the reigning King, Charles XV., is cousin to Napoleon III., his mother having been the daughter of Prince Eugene, uncle to the Emperor of the French. Prince Oscar is thirty-eight years old; he married in 1857, a Princess of Nassau, by whom he has had four children.
