have made, and was self-evident from the article in question, we will reply to it as it is the only thing of particular note in his article. Had he taken the trouble to ask the Collector of Internal Reveaue, he might have learned that our shippers had shipped foreign and obtained drawbacks for the tax; he would also have learned that the Commissioner at Washington and not the Collector at Wilmington, allowed the drawback claims, and he might have learned that our merchants receive their draw-back funds generally in three months less time than the New York shippers. He would then be nearer speaking "by the book."

We are glad that the Journal has learned, after reading our article, that direct trade was not inangurated yesterday, and are pleased to see the beneficial results of reading the Post, at so early a day of its existence. We still have the "presumption to presume" that when an editor wonders why our merchants do not avail themselves of a law, which all shippers are perfectly familiar with, and are daily availing themselves of, he is doing those merchants and shippers an injustice.

We have had a daily intercourse with all the principal shippers of this city for many months, and we feel as competent to declare their high standing and business integrity, as a man who may have lived in the city from boyhood.

WILMINGTON MANUFACTORIES .- The Wilmington Manufactoring Company is the name of a large establishment engaged in the manufacture of barrels. It is located in the old "Clarendon iron works" buildings, and employs about one hundred hands. They commenced opperations on the 17th of April last, and organized with the following officers: JAMES A. WEBB, President: T. E. ROBERTS, Vice President, and HENRY ROB-BRTS, Secretary. Their machinery is capable of turning out one hundred and fifty barrels per day, which they sell here, in Charleston and New York. Their spirit casks are prepared by a pat ent precess of inserting the glue into the wood, so as to utterly prevent any leakage or evapora tion of any volatile fluid placed in them. They are known as the "PATENT IMPERMEABLE BAR RELS," and meet with ready sale.

Another great advantage gained by using ma chine made barrels is that they always contain (when full) the same quantity of fluid, and the advantage is, that while the tax is paid at 40 gallons to the cask, the purchaser buys on the gaugers certificate, and as the country packages often contain 42 or 43 gallons, the draw-back papers do not agree with the quantity, and the Bills of Lading on foreign shipments, of course, do not agree with the draw-back papers; and hercin lies half the difficulty of foreign shipments. All this is obviated by using machine made barrels, gauging exactly the same; and as barrels can be manulactured here and shipped to New York at a profit, competing with the "New York pack ages" at home, we think when they become known, they will supersede them entirely in their home market.

BONNETS FOR AUGUST .- For the benefit of our lady readers with whom fashion always wears its greatest charms, we give here, from good auhority, the latest fashion in bonnets. Hats are now larger than bonnets; bonnet

have steadily grown smaller as the season adwanced, until they now consist of nothing more than a mere spray of flowers, selected to match the trimming of the dress, and laid on a light foundation of tulle. This is the favorite style of dress bonnets at the fashionable watering places, and, with the transparent toilet of muslin, grenadine, chambery gauze and other delicate tissues, nothing can be prettier. With the white muslin tollets, of which a great many have been prepared for this month, these little floral head-dresses are erally of violets, forget-me-nots, pinks, daisies and the like, selected with reference to the color of the ribbon with which the dress is trimmed.

BREWER ORPHAN ASSYDUM is the name of a beautiful home for colored orphan children, loeated on " Middle Sound."

It is under the supervision of the Rev. S. Ashley and under the immediate charge of Mr. WM. CLARKE, who is ably assisted by a matron and a teacher. There are about forty children there at this time, who would be wandering about the streets but for this institution. Homes are provided for them as fast as possible, and the larger boys are placed in different localities to learn useful trades. The children are of all ages, from six months to twelve years, and all old enough are placed in the school-room. A gymnasium is at their disposal during the hours of recreation, and all old enough, work in the fields a portion of each day. A NEW BUILING. - Messrs. E. MURRAY & Co. have contracted for the erection of a new brick building for an office and warehouse on North Water, between Princess and Chestnut sts. It is to have a front of 29 feet and will run back 70 feet. It is being built by the firm mentioned, under a lease contract with Mrs. Noves, the owner of the land. This is, we think, an excellent way to pay rent, and we recommend the plan of these gentlemen to all of their neigbors, who can prof It thereby.

PRACHES .- This delicious fruit, the crowning glory of the orchard, is exceedingly scarce in the market this summer. They arrive slowly and in small lots, and sell rapidly at the rates of \$3 per bushel. In Petersburg, which is much further to the north of us, they are selling at \$1 50 and \$2 per bushel, and are much more plentiful than they are here. If some of our friends in Duplin and Sampson were to send the surplus of their large orchards to this market they would, beyond a doubt, realize well in the venture.

THE IMMORTAL J. N .- A great many of those who were here during the latter part of the war, will recollect the queer genius, calling himself J. N. only, who stumped the South in favor of closing the war on a plan for which J. N. had taken out a patent from the Machiavellian school. But J. > THE CASE OF FRANK. SMITH -FRANKLIN SMITH who was convicted for the crime of rape upon one Susanna Smith at the April term of that Criminal Court, and from which verdict an appeal was taken by the defendant's counsel, J. L. RHOADES, Esq., to the Supreme Court, was resentenced yesterday by his Honor, Judge MEARES, to suffer the death penalty on the 30th inst., between the hours of 10 o'clock, A. M., and 4 o'clock, P. M. The Supreme Court having decided that no error was committed by the Court below. The counsel, in brief and appropriate remarks spoke of the disadvantages under which he labored in managing the defence of the case and asked his Honor to grant sufficient time for an effort to obtain executive clemency, as evidence was in existence that led him to believe that the prisoner, at the time the offence was alledged to have been committed, was incompetent to commit such a crime.
