WE understand a gentleman residing in this city contemplates erecting at an early day, a row of dwelling houses with all the modern conveniences, and that they are to be let at a much lower rate than is now charged for inferior buildings. He has already ordered the working plans and when these are completed we shall be able to give more details.

A score of comfortable dwellings at reasonable prices could probably be rented if now ready within the next twenty four hours. We know of at least half a dozen gentlemen now boarding, who are anxious to obtain houses, but as yet they have not been able to do so. For houses fit to be occupied, a price is demanded far above the reach of any ordinary income. Those held at a moderate rate as a rule are not tenantable. This state of things cannot last long and we gladly chronicle the fact, that there is a prospect of relief ahead. In the meantime those in want of houses must be content to pay board.

The construction of side-walks in some parts of this city would bring into market many houses and lots now almost useless to any body because not to be reached without great inconvenience.

We are aware that there are difficulties in the way of this improvement but it is a matter worth considering, whether the proparty holders would not find it for their interest to act voluntarily in the matter and not wait for formal action.


