Kentucky Election.

THE MARKETS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—It appears from records in the Smithsonian Institute that the entire fall of rain of the late storm was nearly six inches, which Prof. Henry says exceeds the entire amount of any previous August for years.

Thirty-four members of the bar of the District of Columbia, disapproving of any review of the orders of the Court at public meetings of the bar, and disavowing the attempt to bind them to the action of the meeting held in the Court-room a week ago, held a public meeting this evening to give expression to these views.

The Postmaster General has ordered the mail route between Vicksburg and Mobile re-opened for competition, the contractor having forfeited it. The route is three hundred and seventy-six miles long. Mail twice a week in good boats.

Signor Marcella Cerruti—the new Italian minister has arrived.

Half a dozen volunteer officers, ranging from captain to colonel were mustered out to-day, also two chaplains.

Internal revenue collected to-day \$323,000. Gen. Howard has had no intimation of his removal. The Secretary of War did inform Howard during his recent interview that he had heard nothing of it.

The President visits the Baltimore Schuerten fest to-morrow.

Official returns of the Kentucky election show that Helm beats the radical candidate fifty-six thousand 1, third party seventy-four thousand; majority over both, forty-three thousand.

Business portion of Plattsburg, N. Y., was burned to-day.

Gen. Sickles' refusal to obey the Executive order restraining him from interfering with the processes of the Supreme Court was discussed in Cabinet meeting yesterday. There is reason for stating that he will be superseded unless he obeys.

From New Orleans.
NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 21.—Resolution last night adopted by both boards of Aldermen declaring it the opinion of Common Council of any further retention in office of the present Controller, Surveyor, City Attorney, Assistant City Attorney and Coroner be disregarded. Reconstruction act calling on General Commanding to remove these officials.

Ten deaths from yellow fever yesterday. Weather cooler and pleasant.

COLUMBIA, Aug. 21.—Total number registered to-day was 57; of which 35 were white and 22 colored.

From Washington.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 21.—Regarding statements that Gen. Magruder was disrespectedly treated at New York stock exchange. Magruder publishes a card saying he never was at the stock Exchange—don't know where it is. Secretary McCulloch writes assistant Treasurer at New York flatly contradicting recent statements of treasury irregularities.
