From Washington. WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—It is said the ram Stonewall put into Norfolk in a sinking condition.

Stevens it is reported is becoming alarmingly feeble.

The military authorities are arming the citizens at Fort Sedgwick for the protection of the post.

The following is represented as the conclusion of Sickles' argument supporting his order No. 10: "If the United States Courts in the rebel States be allowed to control the military authority, the execution of the Reconstruction acts, for obvious reasons, will soon become impossible.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The following statement in relation to Gen. Sickles' Order No. 10, and the executive order thereupon will correct the current misapprehension: On the 14th inst., the instructions sent to Gen. Sickles excepting United States courts from military orders, and views were suspended until his report and views upon the matter could be received.
