From Washington. WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—It is stated that Gen. Grant has written to the President, claiming that Congress vested the authority in the five districts in Generals of the United States Army.

From Richmond. RICHMOND, Aug. 28.—To-day, before the United States Commission, the counsel of a party charged with evading the revenue law plead want of jurisdiction, on the ground that the revenue law of Congress provided the same number of inspectors in a State as that State had representatives in Congress, and as Virginia has no representatives, there can be no legal inspectors in her limits.

Opinion of Gen. Wade Hampton on Reconstruction. AUGUSTA, GA., Aug. 28.—General Wade Hampton having been solicited by a number of prominent citizens for his views as to the duty of the people of South Carolina in reference to reorganization under the Military Bills, replied in a long letter, arguing against the unjust and unconstitutional nature of the proposed terms. Instances how reconstruction works in Tennessee. Refers to the rejection of the Kentucky representatives, and says should the people accept the situation they have no guarantee that the State will be readmitted unless Radicals are elected who will not represent the views of their constituents. Denies the right of Congress to interfere with suffrage in the States. Counsels justice to blacks, and is in favor of impartial suffrage. Advises the people to register and vote against a Convention.

From New Orleans. NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 28.—The City Council, last evening, appointed the New Branch School directors, Superintendent of the Fire Alarm, and other minor officials. Of the 24 school directors appointed, 8 are colored. The deaths from fever on Monday were 14, and on yesterday, 15. Cyrus Hamlin, son of ex-Vice President Hamlin, died this morning of the fever. It is reported that the late City Attorney and Assistant, and the City Surveyor, have taken steps to institute suit against 20 members of the New City Council for libel, in declaring them incompetent for the positions they recently held.
