But Mr. Johnson has resolved to stop the good work. He virtually tells the ex-Rebels | GEO. KIDD'S CELEBRATED not to accept the terms prescribed by Congress, but to hold back, and resist, and struggle, in the confident hope that the North will come to their aid. And each removal strengthens and arouses whatever of disloyalty remains at the South.
