A Proclamation by the President.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—WHEREAS, by the Constitution of the United States, the Executive power is vested in a President of the United States of America, who is bound by solemn oath to faithfully execute the office of President, and to the best of his ability, to preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States, and is by the same instrument made Commander-in-Chief of the army and navy of the United States, and is required to take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

From San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 31.—The past week's receipts of bullion from the mines is one million two hundred thousand dollars. The market took one million and fifty eight thousand dollars.

From Charleston.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Sept. 3.—Gen. Canby arrived this afternoon with family and Staff and took quarters at Mills House. Returns from all portions of the State indicate that interest in registration is flagging. Blacks have so far more than two thirds of the whole number registered.
